

In Conduct Committee

Faculty Decision Mulled

The Student Conduct Committee discussed recent Faculty Senate action on closing hours, approved visiting hours for three dormitories, and approved three amendments to the Conduct Code in its first meeting of winter term Tuesday.

There was some disagreement among the committee members on how to interpret the Faculty Senate's earlier decision on closing hours but no decision was reached.

The Faculty Senate voted to instruct the conduct committee "to enforce Section IIF, violation of closing hours, notwithstanding Section IA6" which calls for equal treatment of men and women.

The committee felt there was a contradiction between the two and dismissed two cases last term on the grounds Section II F was discriminating against women.

Professor Scott Nobles, a committee member, said that such a decision by the Faculty Senate would put him in a difficult ethical position.

He felt he could not decide upon a closing hours case without considering IA6 a contradiction.

Phil Barnhart, student member, said he considered the Senate's action as a moratorium on section IA6.

Bruce Brothers disagreed and expressed the opinion that nothing should be done until another case came before the committee or until the faculty made another decision.

The problem of closing hours may come before the faculty meeting today.

The committee approved visit-

ing hours submitted by DeBusk, Carson and Watson Dormitories.

Visiting hours for DeBusk will be 7 p.m. to 10:30 p.m. on weekdays, 8 p.m. to 1:30 a.m. on Friday, 12 p.m. to 1:30 a.m. on Saturday and 12 p.m. to 10:30 p.m. on Sunday.

Hours for Carson will be from 1 p.m. to 5 p.m. on Saturday and Sunday and 7 p.m. to 11 p.m. on Monday, Wednesday and Friday.

Watson will have visiting hours 8 p.m. to 12 p.m. Sunday through Thursday; 8 p.m. to 2 a.m. on Friday and Saturday and 1 p.m. to 5 p.m. Saturday and Sunday afternoons.

In other action the committee approved the addition of the words "A student may, in writing, waive the three day notice of hearing" to Section II A 10 a 1. This has been in actual prac-

tice for some time.

The committee also approved "A student may, in writing, waive the 24 hour notice of hearing" to be added to Section II B 8 a. This also provides for a process already in practice.

To make explicit the role of the Associate Dean of Students as secretary to the Committee the words "The Associate Dean of Students, or his representative" shall serve as secretary and advisor to the Court was added to II C 1.

The committee's final action was to strike Section II D 3 from the Code which says "Where sufficient evidence exists that a violation of law has occurred, the Associate Dean of Student ordinarily shall refer the case and transmit the evidence to the appropriate law enforcement agency."

Morse to Kickoff Greek Focus Week

Senator Wayne Morse and a "focus on politics," will open Greek Focus Week Monday. Morse will speak at 8 p.m. in McArthur Court.

Students belonging to fraternities and sororities have planned Greek Focus Week, January 15 to 19 and geared it to a specific area of interest each day. Speakers and entertainers will highlight the different days' events concerning politics, community, campus, controversy, entertainment, and sports.

A panel on Tuesday will discuss civil disobedience. Panel members will be Clyde DeBerry of the Desegregation Institute of the University, James Klonoski, head of the political science department, who was formerly the regional head of the Congress on Racial Equality (CORE), John Howard, professor of sociology, and Robert Friedman, professor of speech. There will also be a U.S. District attorney and a local attorney on the panel.

Wednesday's focus will be on campus with the Bitterlick Singers performing in the EMU at 4 p.m. A film, Shakespeare's "Winter's Tale," and a PL-3 television special will also be shown.

Thursday's focus controversy brings Robert Welch of the John Birch Society and features underground films.

Weekend events will begin with a Friday at 4, followed by the Lou Rawls concert at 8 p.m.

Draft Increase Due in March

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Pentagon called Tuesday for 39,000 men to be drafted in March, the highest military manpower request in 17 months.

The March request, placed with the Selective Service System, is the highest since October 1966 when the Pentagon sought 49,200 inductees.

Other draft quotas this year included January's 34,000 and February's 23,300.

Monthly draft calls are based on planned increases in the military system and varying replacement needs.

The Pentagon said the March draft quota "supports currently approved force levels and will assure a timely flow of replacements for men completing their terms of service."

The March inductees will go into the Army as they have for the past 23 months.

Fir Eating Bug Runs for Title

CORVALLIS, Ore. (AP)—The Oregon rain beetle has won the backing of the head of the Oregon State University entomology department as the top candidate for the official state insect.

Paul Richter had been campaigning for the snake fly. But he switched his allegiance to the rain beetle, "because of its adaptation to the Oregon climate."

The rain beetle, however, has one drawback. It feeds off the roots of the Douglas fir, which is the Oregon state tree.
