

UO Riflemen Plan Meets

A rifle team has formed at the University.

According to Alan Cochran, captain, the team formed under the auspices of the student union and will meet a full schedule of opponents including Junction City, the Shedd Rifle Club, and Oregon State.

According to Cochran, there wasn't a team last year because there was no place to shoot. This year, though, the team gained the use of the Eugene Moose Lodge at 12th and Taylor.

Competition will be held in prone, sitting, kneeling and standing positions. A contestant may earn a maximum of 100 points in each event. After each person has participated in each of the four events, the top five scores will make up the team score.

Competitors will use small-bore rifles and shoot over a 50 foot range. A team may score a maximum of 2000 points in a match.

Kickers Await Play

Oregon's Ducks resume Portland Soccer Assn. play Sunday when they meet Stein Haus at 2 p.m. at Portland's Delta Park. The Ducks won the league's first half last month, finishing one point ahead of second place Stein Haus.

The Duck kickers are assured of a playoff, but could win the league title outright with another first place finish. Stein Haus, whose only first half loss was a 3-1 decision on Hayward Field, is considered Oregon's biggest threat.

The Webfoot booters' last outing was a 2-1 loss to St. Patricks in the Cameron Cup Tournament semi-finals Dec. 10. The UO squad played shorthanded, but welcomed the return of English forward John Morgan who finished second in scoring last season.
