

Grad Research Project Open

The Institute of International Studies and Overseas Administration has announced the approval of six overseas research training projects for Oregon graduate students for the summer, 1968. The projects and the respective faculty directors are:

Guatemala, Carl Johanssen of the Department of Geography to study the improvement, cultivation, and marketing of useful plants by the aboriginal people.

Guatemala, Clarence Thurber of the School of Community Service and Public Affairs will direct the study of the administrative aspects of agricultural planning and development.

Ireland, Edward Price, Department of Geography, to study former estate lands in County Galway and effects of subdivision plans on present farming.

Japan, Ralph Falconeri of the history department, will direct the research elements of modernization in selected local areas of cities in the Tokuriku district of west coast Japan.

Mexico, George Andrews, Department of Architecture, for the study of the settlement patterns and architecture in the area of Campeche, Yucatan Peninsula.

Taiwan, Angela Palandri of the Department of Oriental Languages, will direct the research on Confucian influences in contemporary Chinese life in the Republic of China.

Graduate students interested in doing field research on these topics should consult with the professor in charge of the project. Competence in the language of the country is required. All student participants must be American citizens and planning to return to the University campus in fall 1968.

Students may obtain application forms and information on the summer fellowships for these projects from the main office of the Institute, room 736 Prince Lucian Campbell Hall. Applications will be open until February 9, 1968. Awards will be announced by March 1. The period of the fellowship will be for 12 weeks beginning June 15, 1968.

Dutch Program Beckons Prof.

Harold K. Strom has been named the 1968-69 exchange professor for the University's Netherlands exchange program for young men interested in international business.

Strom, associate professor of transportation, is chairman of the Graduate School of Management and Business in the College of Business Administration. He will serve as the American exchange professor for the Oregon students attending the Netherlands School of Business during 1968-69, while an equal number of Dutch students study here.

Donald Tull, head of the Department of Marketing, Insurance and Transportation, was named the alternate exchange professor for the program.

Students interested in applying for the program should contact Strom as soon as possible. Male business administration majors are eligible who will be within 10 term hours of junior standing by the fall of 1968, and meet certain other requirements.
