HHH Defends War, McCarthy Criticizes

FRESNO, Calif.—Vice President Hubert H. Humphrey defended the Vietnam War Saturday before cheering California Democrats and said the tide has turned in favor of President Johnson's re-election.

But U.S. Senator Eugene McCarthy (D-Minn.) who is opposing a slate of pro-Johnson delegates in California's June presidential primary, criticized the war. He said he detected signs of support for his own presidential candidacy in the nation's most populous state.

The two Democrats offered their conflicting views as the party began its 1968 campaign with a statewide conference. Humphrey spoke to the conference, while McCarthy huddled separately with rebellious Democratic leaders of the peace delegation he will lead in the primary.

"The tide has turned very definitely in the past three months," Humphrey told newsmen after his speech. "The President's stock has gone up considerably."

Some 1,000 Democrats attended the conference and gave Humphrey a standing ovation as he said the United States must stand firm in Vietnam now to avoid a third world war later.

In his speech Humphrey warned against splinter movements.

"A Republican candidate could possibly be elected if by our disunity and disarray we help him," Humphrey said.

LOS ANGELES — Senator Eugene McCarthy, carrying his campaign for the Democratic presidential nomination to the nation's most populous state, says the Vietnam war has gen-

erated a spirit of "joylessness and fear" in America.

The Minnesota Democrat said the "frustrations of the poor and the unpleasantness of our cities cannot be separated" from the war.

McCarthy, who plans to run in several Democratic primaries, opened today a six-day campaign swing through California.

His initial speech was prepared for delivery at a Los Angeles luncheon.

McCarthy said the war has distorted the nation's priorities. During the last two sessions of Congress total appropriations increased by \$39 billion—all but \$2.6 billion of the total for defense program, he said.

McCarthy told his Los Angeles audience the Johnson administration "has committed itself, without really consulting anybody" to the generals leading South Vietnam, "and is fulfilling that commitment with money and energy to spare."

He said Johnson should devote more attention to social problems at home "because we also have major commitments to our own citizens."

MANCHESTER, N.H. — The nation needs laws permitting limited use of wire tapping and eavesdropping devices to combat organized crime, Republican presidential aspirant George Romney said Saturday.

The Michigan governor spoke in a school cafeteria before a meager audience of 35 in Raymond, a town with a population of 7,000.

He is on a speech-making hand-shaking tour of the Granite State trying to generate votes for his candidacy in the March 12 primary.

Romney said President Johnson promised, but had failed to propose "substantive legislation to fight organized crime."

The Justice Department's activities in this area "have been drastically reduced" since Johnson took office, he said.

Nearly every Presidential Crime Commission recommendation has been ignored by the President, he added.

Legislation is needed, he said, that would allow qualified lawmen to use eavesdropping equipment under a court order granted at the request of the attorney general.
