Romney to Visit Oregon Soon
Montgomery Predicts GOP Gains

PORTLAND — The director of George Romney's campaign in Oregon said Tuesday the Michigan governor will spend at least 20 days in Oregon before the May 28 presidential primary.

Leonard A. Forsgren, Portland insurance man who has been acting state coordinator of Romney's Oregon campaign, said names will be announced later of people who will lead it. Romney's first Oregon appearance for the GOP presidential nomination will be Feb. 23 at the Portland City Club and then at the Dorchester Conference in Lincoln City that night.

Forsgren said Romney plans to spend his vacation in Oregon and will conduct "a very aggressive personal campaign" in the state similar to the one in New Hampshire.

KEENE, N.H. — Michigan Governor George Romney said Tuesday the United States should use its influence to persuade Saigon to enter peace talks with the Communist National Liberation Front in Vietnam.

The campaigning governor said the Communist organization should not be dealt with as a legitimate government but "it has to be reckoned with in any settlement in Vietnam."

"I think we should encourage them to have discussions," Romney said.

He said the United States should make the Saigon government "realize that other nations are losing lives and sacrificing a great deal."

"They ought to be willing to explore things that might lead to a sound settlement," Romney said.

Earlier, after proposing "guaranteed neutralization" of all Vietnam, Romney said that if elected president he would "push it as hard as I can."

"By guaranteed neutralization I mean that North and South Vietnam, Laos and Cambodia would be de-fused from cold war conflict, liberated from the destructive presence of so-called wars of national liberation, and relieved of the use or threat of force as a way of resolving goals on their own territory," he said.

In Salem, N. H., Romney said Wednesday the country needs a president who will "get better men" on the Supreme Court so that it will stop trying to legislate in its decisions.

Talking in southern New Hampshire living rooms, the Michigan governor said, "I don't believe that the court has the right to legislate."

At each step in a series of home visits, Romney was asked about the court and its decisions.

Romney said the Supreme Court majority is now "using the court to reflect their own viewpoints, social viewpoints."

SALEM — House Speaker F. F. Montgomery says this is the year "the GOP can score fantastic gains from the White House to the county courthouse."

He urged Republican candidates today to declare their intentions now and get to work.

"The members of the Republican Party deserve the right to know whom their choices will be in the May primary."

"If the candidates announce

their plans in the very near future, the voters will have an ample opportunity to sift through the ideas presented by the candidates in order to make a wise decision at the polls," the Eugene Republican said.

WASHINGTON, D. C. — Governor Ronald Reagan of California told Republican congressional leaders today he is ending out-of-state speaking tours with a current round of 10 speeches in four states.

Reagan met with Republican leaders of House and Senate and National Chairman Ray Bliss for an hour, and told a brief news conference he had found a new spirit of enthusiasm among Republicans everywhere he has gone.

Reagan, expected to head a California favorite son delegation to the GOP presidential nominating convention, has been looked upon as a possibly serious contender for first place on the ticket.

Appeal Planned
In Kunkle Case

Attorney for Ronald Kunkle, Charles O. Porter, said Wednesday he plans to try to get the Eugene School Board to change its mind on the discharge of the fifth grade teacher.

The decision to uphold the firing of Kunkle was made after a hearing which ended Tuesday.

Porter said he might go to the Intermediate Education Board or to the courts if necessary.

Kunkle, who was fired for insubordination and inefficiency, maintains his dismissal was due to his beliefs about controversial issues, such as civil rights and the Vietnam war.

governor had said specifically he plans no further out-of-state speeches until the August convention. This would eliminate any campaigning in states where his name probably will be entered in primaries.

LINCOLN, Neb. — Secretary of State Frank Marsh says that if he were to pick names for Nebraska's presidential preference primary ballot at this time, he would list at least six presidential prospects, including New York Governor Nelson Rockefeller.

Marsh will make his final decision on May 14 primary candidates on Feb. 14. Nebraska's law is modeled on Oregon's where the names of those being placed on the ballot will be announced in mid March.

Marsh said other Republicans he would list as of now are California Governor Ronald Reagan, and two active candidates, former Vice-President Richard Nixon and Michigan Governor George Romney.

Democrats who would go on the ballot are President Johnson and Senator Eugene McCarthy of Minnesota.

Other possibilities, he said, are Democratic Senator Robert Kennedy and Republican Senator Charles Percy.

Alabama Governor George Wallace would go on the ballot as a third party presidential prospect if Wallace announces his candidacy and if his Nebraska supporters meet statutory requirements for forming a third party in the state, Marsh said.

Consideration might also be given the alternative of listing Wallace on the Democratic ticket, he noted.

A listed candidate has 30 days after Feb. 14 to withdraw his name by affidavit. Names also can be added to the primary ballot list via petitions signed by at least 100 voters in each of the state's three congressional districts.

Marsh said he has not wholly ruled out consideration of three additional Republicans, Senator Mark Hatfield of Oregon, New York Mayor John Lindsay and Ohio Governor James Rhodes, but at this time all are "sort of doubtful."

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Students Plan Foreign Fete
