

Fraternities Checked By ASUO Committee

The ASUO Committee on Discrimination investigated the compliance of Sigma Phi Epsilon and Beta Theta to the University's policy of local autonomy, in a meeting Tuesday.

Ron Greenman, president of Sig Eps, stated that the chapter had sent a letter to the National Board of Directors asking that a by-law subjecting new members to national approval be waived. The national office responded by asking that a petition relating the position of the members on membership selection be submitted. A new plan for selection was also requested.

Greenman added that the lack of communication between the local and national levels has hindered the local chapter's attempt to comply with University policy. He added that the use of a waiver was suggested this summer by the University's

chapter at the Sig Eps national convocation.

Tom Grant of Beta said that the local chapter had made no attempt to comply with University policy. He added that the national directors had no waiver power, such as the Sig Eps, had in regard to a national by-law.

The fraternity planned to write a letter to the national Beta office requesting the inclusion of a waiver motion on next summer's national convention agenda. The committee requested that the Beta's receive assurance that the motion be placed on the agenda.

After the fraternity representatives left, the committee passed a motion which said that the "Sigma Phi Epsilon National is in direct violation of the University's requirement for local autonomy by requiring that the national board review the local chapter's proposed new membership selection plan before the national board will grant a waiver to the local chapter." They further recommended that President Arthur S. Flemming immediately inform the national office of this violation.

In regard to Beta compliance the committee passed a motion that President Flemming open the dossier on Beta Theta Pi. It was also requested that the local chapter write the national office requesting the question of local autonomy to be placed on their 1968 convention agenda. The local chapter was also asked to sound out on the subject of local autonomy.

If the fraternities do not comply with University policy they must move off-campus, which limits the participation in University activities.

Another possibility is that the local chapter can disassociate with the national organization. Tom Grant said, "the University is fraternity life, and it is more important to be affiliated with the University than the national organization."

The committee acts only as a pressure group. They can only suggest and prompt action by a fraternity, and make recommendations to President Flemming.
