

Foreign Fete

Participants Plea
For Local Support

The International Festival will be presented this spring without outside sponsoring, it was announced Wednesday by foreign student leaders.

Foreign students have issued a plea for community support for the annual event, which is tentatively scheduled for April 11-14.

Sergio Granados, president of the Foreign Students Organization and a graduate student in physics from Costa Rica, said, "It is imperative that this year's festival be a financial success."

The international students have taken over all organization and execution of the festival following withdrawal of the campus YM-YWCA as sponsor.

The festival piled up a \$4,000 deficit last year, Granados said. A nine-member committee has been formed to reorganize

the structure of the festival and trim expenses.

Foreign students need a profit from the show to support scholarship and loan funds, he said. Tuition is up, he noted, and state-supported foreign student scholarships were reduced in number by legislative cuts.

Foreign student enrollment climbed to an all-time high of 838 students, however.

Foreign students expect to make greater use of technical assistance from various departments of the campus, eliminate the salary of a director and other staff members, and rely on volunteer service, according to Atef Sharkay, a graduate student in architecture from Egypt, who is serving as general chairman of the International Festival.

The festival will still consist of a stage production in McArthur Court and an exhibition and bazaar in the EMU.

Anant Chavan, founder and former director of the festival, said, "We want to raise the standard of the entertainment, and will seek technical help from such departments as interior design, the art school and the school of dance."

recommendation tonight, it will probably formulate its own proposal to send to President Flemming," said Board Chairman Tom Nash.

EMU Director Dick Reynolds agreed with Nash.

"The board has been working on this restructure for four months..."

"The senate is in a hurry to make the change... They'll formulate their own proposal if you (the board) don't give them one..."

"President Flemming would probably accept the senate's proposal, and if he does want minor changes made, he'd send it back to the senate, not the board, for reconsideration... I doubt if the board would ever see it (the proposal) again."

The philosophy of the proposal, which would separate the functions of the EMU Board in two bodies, one for programming and one for policy making, was acceptable to most board members.

Only one board faculty member, Sanford "Sandy" Tepfer objected.

"If the people who are running the programs aren't also making the policies, then you lose all communication between the administration and the operation," said Tepfer.

The other board members seemed to go along with member Allyn Brown who said, "We committed ourselves to the senate months ago to come up with a restructure proposal."

The board set down four problems on Oct. 19, 1967, as reasons for restructure:

- The need to co-ordinate board-senate programming;

- The work load on board members who were also program division chairmen, compounded last week when the board took over the additional responsibilities of the old Student Activities Committee;

- The need to keep unity and "total" programming in one body;

- The board's primary responsibility for all non-classroom education.

But board members have been unable to agree on specific restructure questions, and have already rejected "five or six" proposals, said Nash.

Several board members were concerned that the present proposal will necessitate future re-vamping of the board again when it proves unworkable.

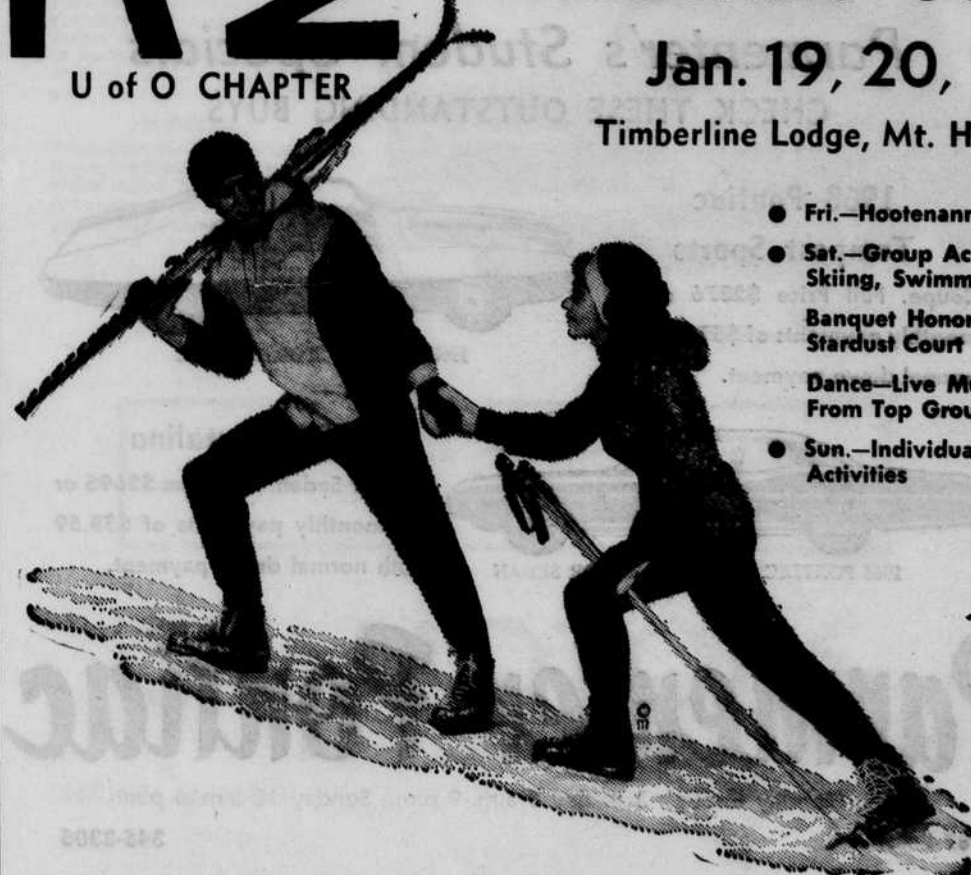
