Love and his teammates, the undefeated Frosh basketball team, go into Saturday evening's battle with traditional rival Oregon State with a single thought in mind: Keep the record perfect.

Love's comment was based on the fact that the Ducklings use the fast break a great deal, while the Rooks, like their varsity, are mainly a ball control team. The Rooks last Monday night beat the Washington Pups 57-47, two evenings after the Frosh had topped Washington by a 91-76 score.

OSU is led by Tim Perkins and Jeff Haller, 6-5 and 6-6 forwards, respectively.

The Frosh roster was bolstered this week by the return to action of 6-5 Australian Rodney Wulff, who had been gone since the second week of December with a bad knee. His knee was

If the colds, accompanying sore throats and headache pain which now plague the 7-0 Bartolome and the 6-5 Petersen happen to abate, the two will join forward Gary Freeman (6-9), and guards Vince Fritz (6-4) and Gary Carroll (5-11) in the Beaver lineup.

OSU began their Pacific Eight season with home victories over California and Stanford, after which optimism was rampant on the sprawling agricultural campus. All the murmurs of "This team has a chance against UCLA" were silenced during last week's action, however. The Beavers blew away games to Washington State 82-62, and Washington 68-56.

Oregon State's 6-5 overall record looks good in comparison to the 3-9 mark Oregon will take into Saturday's encounter. The Ducks are 0-4 in league play.

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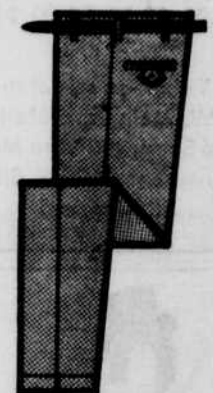
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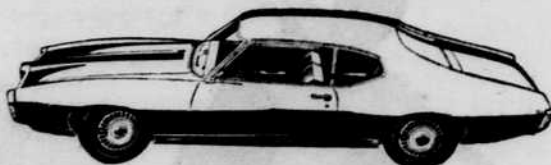
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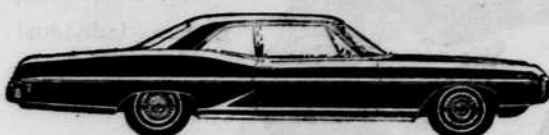
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
