

Undefeated Ducklings Win Tenth

Frosh Drop Rooks

Oregon State's Rooks, unable to work their deliberate ball control offense to full advantage, couldn't cope with the fast play of the Oregon Frosh and lost, 76-56, to the Ducklings at Eugene Saturday.

Center Stan Love scored 11 points within four minutes of the first half to break apart a tight game and lead the undefeated Frosh to their tenth consecutive win.

With the Rooks trailing only 16-12 after eight and one-half minutes of play, Love broke loose with a barrage of points, and with 7:46 remaining in the half the Frosh led 29-13. Two minutes later it was 35-14, and Oregon had complete control of the game.

Gap Narrows

The Rooks closed the gap to 42-48 at halftime, but the Ducklings, led this time by Bill Drozdak and Carlton Slater, widened

the margin to a maximum of 28 points, 72-44, with 6:17 left in the game. OSU hammered away at the Frosh reserves, outscoring them 10-2 in the last five minutes of the game, but the outcome was already assured.

Love finished the game with 21 points. He was followed by Drozdak, who had 19, and Slater with 14.

High for the Rooks was Tom Phipps with 14. Jeff Haller had 11, and Larry Webber and Tim Perkins each put in 10 points.

OSU Effective

Oregon State's slowdown ball had a definite effect on the potent Duckling offense. The 76-point output was the lowest of the season for the Frosh, who had averaged 96.9 points going into the contest.

The team's 59 rebounds were one of the lowest of the year (team average was 66.0), and the free throw percentage, 48 per cent for 12 of 25 foul shots made, was the poorest of the

campaign.

Oregon hit 32 of 72 shots from the field for a .444 percentage, while the Rooks connected on 19 of 57 field goal attempts for .333. OSU lost the ball 15 times to the Ducklings' 12.

Swimmers Split; Hartman Excels

Oregon's swimming team, led by diver Dennis Hartman, invaded sunny California, harvesting a win and a loss in a pair of contests.

The Ducks lost to Stanford, 75-36, and beat Cal at Berkely, 65-48.

Hartman took first place points in the one and three meter diving events against the Indians. His ten points accounted for nearly a third of the Duck total in their loss to the defending NCAA champions.

The Indians were as powerful as the Ducks expected. The Palo Altoites scored wins in nine of eleven swimming events. Their times were good enough to break five meet records.

Oregon's Bob Boyer and Edd Wemple accounted for the two remaining victories. Boyer continued to churn up opponents in his specialty, the 50 yard freestyle, with a 22.1 time.

Wemple set new varsity and meet records by clocking a 2:17.6 200 yard breaststroke. Wemple's victory, at the expense of Olympic Gold Medal winner Dick Roth, qualified him for the NCAA championships.

Hartman again soared to victory in the diving events the following day. He was joined by Boyer in the double win column as the Ducks upended the University of California, 65-48.

Boyer equalled his previous day's time of 22.1 in 50 yard freestyle, and edged Cal competitors by less than a second with his 100 yard freestyle time of 49.1.

Swim coach Don Van Rossen described this meet as a "terrifically exciting one, with a lot of alumni support which helped the team's moral." Adding to the meet's excitement were a number of races decided

by under two seconds. Among these were the 100 yard freestyle, 200 yard butterfly, and 200 yard backstroke.

An unusual statistic concerning this meet was the fact that times in every event set new meet records.

Duck swimmers finished one-two in 50 yard freestyle, both diving events, and the breaststroke. Oregon's Don Peterson turned in an outstanding backstroke time of 2:22.2, his season best.

The weekend split brought the Duck's record to four wins, one loss.

Brigham Young Narrowly Edges Duck Wrestlers

It was close, but Oregon's wrestlers lost out to nationally recognized powerhouse Brigham Young 15-12.

Had they won, it would have made the whole dismal weekend worthwhile. As it turned out, Oregon lost all three matches of its two-day Utah tour.

The Ducks lost to Utah 20-9 Friday at Salt Lake City, to Minnesota 20-9 Saturday at Provo, and to the Cougars in the Saturday afternoon finale. Their record slipped from 5-1 to 5-4.

Oregon's triumphs against Brigham Young came in couples. Ducks wrestling in the two lightest weight classifications, John Miller at 123, and Brent Merrill at 130, and the two heaviest wrestlers, 177 pound Eddy Dunn and heavy-weight Tim Wilmarth, were the Oregon winners.

Undefeated Miller decisioned the Cougars' Chuck Henry 6-1, Merrill defeated Mike McAdams 6-4, Dunn defeated Merrill Cook 6-3, and Wilmarth defeated Bob Christianson, 3-0.

All except Dunn had been held out of the Minnesota match earlier in the day for reasons of preservation. Coach Art Keith wanted to save his guns for the Cougar match.

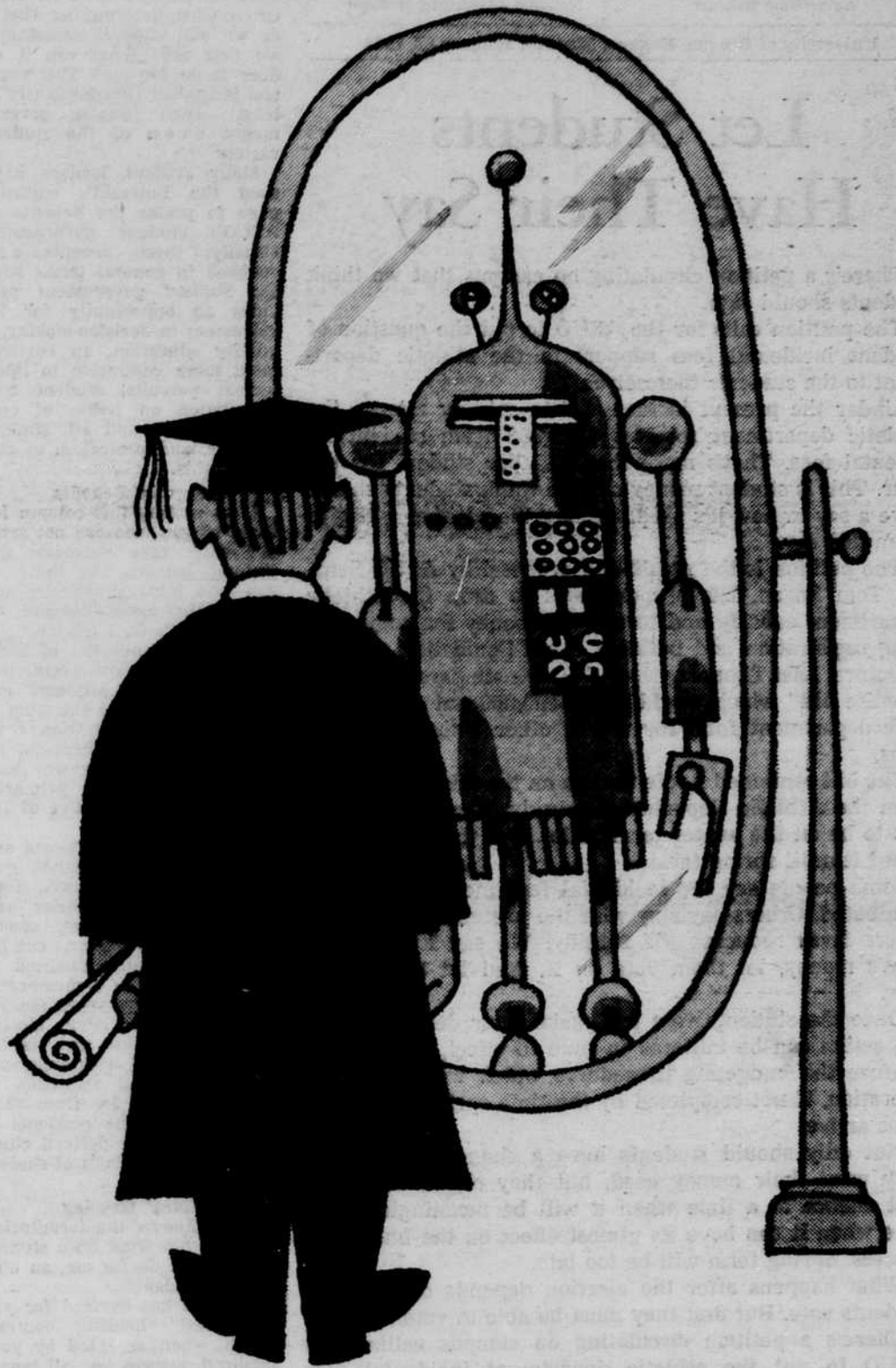
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
