WASHINGTON (AP) — Two college students unscrewed the heavy brass nameplate from the wall of the Soviet Embassy and were walking off with it when caught.

A policeman said in General Sessions Court he stopped the youths after spotting them carrying the plaque down an alley adjoining the embassy.

The State Department returned the plaque to the embassy, offered apologies and said Soviet officials appeared only mildly upset. The youths were charged with petty larceny.

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Chemistry Professor Garners Fellowship

The National Science Foundation has awarded University chemistry professor Robert Mazo one of 55 senior post-doctoral fellowships in chemistry for 1968-69.

The award was instituted to enable faculty members to do additional study and research.

Mazo is hopeful of going on sabbatical leave next year to study some of the problems of polymer solutions that contain large molecules. He plans to study at the Free University of Brussels in Belgium.

The fellowship will pay half of his regular salary plus traveling expenses to Belgium and picking up most of his professional expenses, except living

costs, while he is there. The University will pay the other half of his salary.

Mazo hopes to be able to develop a theory which will relate electrical conductivity and viscosity of polymer solutions to the forces between the molecules.

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
