FOUR MEMBERS of the Viet-Vets will give a short account of their impressions of the South Vietnamese people and their society, followed by a question and answer period. The discussion will take place in the World Affairs Briefing Center at noon today.

In Vietnam Debate

Priest Says Push; Lawyer Calls Halt

The United States should take steps to begin negotiation to end a role in South Vietnam that is illegal, ineffective, uneconomic and immoral, said Charles Porter.

Appeasement encourages aggression and is the cause of war, according to the Rev. Daniel Lyons.

Thus went the two opposing points of view in a debate on the Vietnam war Thursday between the former U.S. Congressman and the Jesuit priest.

Porter's initial address maintained that escalation of the war may lead to World War III and withdrawal would expose thousands of South Vietnamese to terrorization by the Communists.

He concluded that a cease-fire armistice was the only solution with ensuing negotiations.

"Unless each of us sacrifices to end the conflict, we must all share the blame for war. Our salvation lies in both words and actions," he said. "We must show Johnson the offensive must stop."

Lyons began by saying Pope Paul has called for peace in Vietnam, but that he has advocated peace without freedom.

He then quipped, "The Pope has called for no more war but then Christ asked man to sin no more."

The world can be divided among those who want to resist aggression and those who do not," he said. He charged Porter with not being opposed to Communist aggression, and then asked, "What will he do when Ho Chi Minh wants to take Thailand and the rest of Southeast Asia?"

"We gave up Laos with negotiation," he said, "and the Vietnam war has been made possible only through Laos."

He claimed the answer to ending the war was the blocking of Haiphong harbor. If the dredges that keep the silt out of the harbor were sunk, 80,000 tons of material a month would be kept out of North Vietnam.

This is a war of aggression, not a civil war, he stated.

In the rebuttal, Porter said the aggression must be stopped by collective action in the United Nations, "no matter how frail it might be."

He further opposed the argument that "we must support the boys." Pounding the table, he asked, "Do we slaughter more because we slaughtered some?"

Lyons countered him by saying that when the bombing is stopped, 700,000 will be freed to increase "aggression" on the South.

The United Nations refuses to touch the issue, he said. The communist nations would block any action against the North, he added.

He called U Thant a friend of Russia, and said he has never called for the North to stop its aggression.
