Mostly General

LELAND RYKEN of Eugene, a doctoral candidate in English at the University, has been named the first recipient of a new Graduate Fellowship in English at the University, honoring the late Rudolph H. Ernst, member of the English faculty at Oregon for more than 28 years.

A GERMAN MUSIC educator will conduct two workshops in music education at the University School of Music during the 1968 summer session.

Wolfgang Longardt, music teacher in the Scharfenberg Schoolfarm, Berlin's most famous public school, will teach a workshop on "First Steps to Music" and a second one on "Use of the Recorder and Instruments for Children."

THE UNIVERSITY will become the second university on the Pacific Coast to offer the Doctor of Philosophy degree in art history, according to Walter Creese, dean of the School of Architecture and Allied Arts.

The new degree was approved at the January meeting of the State Board of Higher Education.

THE DEADLINE for applications to participate in the University's 1968-69 Academic Year Institute in Mathematics for high school mathematics teachers and supervisors, is Feb. 1.

The grant will help 20 teachers improve the quality of their teaching by enabling them to spend an entire academic year in full-time study of their discipline, from September, 1968, to June, 1969.

KWAX, the University FM station, will expand its Saturday night programming starting this week. KWAX will remain on the air until 1 a.m. instead of signing off at midnight.

200 OSU Students Smoke Marijuana

According to the Oregon State Barometer, a Corvallis policeman has estimated that 200 OSU students are using marijuana.

The Oregon State policy concerning the possession and use of drugs, found in the Beaver Code, is as follows: "All Federal, State and local laws governing the use, possession, and sale of drugs are upheld by Oregon State University."

Violation of any law or ordinance concerning possession, furnishing, use, or sale of drugs may result in probation or suspension of the individuals involved.

The Barometer article states that Robert W. Chick, OSU Dean of Students, has said, "Our purpose here is not to punish students. It is to help them in their further growth

and maturation. We don't take any kind of action until the student is proven guilty."

The OSU student newspaper said that because of the system worked out between the University and the police to turn in marijuana pushers, Corvallis has a less apparent problem with drugs than Eugene had four years ago.

How easy is it to get drugs on the OSU campus? One unidentified student told the Barometer, "If you want to know how easy it is to get drugs on campus, I'll tell you. It's as easy as walking from here to there."
