

Love, Drozdiak, Two Others Suspended

Rooks Defeat Frosh

"All you need is Love," so the song goes.

And Drozdiak . . . And Green. . .

Oregon's Frosh basketball team, lacking the vital elements—starting center Stan Love and starting forwards Bill Drozdiak and John Green, who together average 50 points a game—had their undefeated season halted at 11 wins Saturday night.

Host Oregon State, showing no mercy for the "wingless" Ducklings, avenged an earlier loss and handed the Frosh a 73-44 defeat.

Ducklings Suspended

Love, Droziak and Green, along with reserve forward Jay Crittenden, were handed one-game suspensions by the coaching staff Saturday morning for a minor infraction of training rules.

Love is the leading scorer with a 22.4 average, Drozdiak is second with a 17.3 average, and Green carries a 10.9 mark. Love is also leading rebounder, with Green second and Drozdiak third.

Their absence showed. And it hurt.

The Frosh roster down to nine, Oregon made the trip to Corvallis with one forward, two centers and six guards. Leonard Jackson, normally a 6-5 guard, was moved to forward with Marty James; 6-7, 230 pound Mike Williams started at center;

and 5-9 fireball Carlton Slater shared backcourt with Rick Brosterhous.

The combination was not effective. It lacked the scoring punch. It lacked the rebounding punch. And it lacked the defensive punch.

Lead at Start

The Frosh moved to a 7-4 lead in the first four minutes of the contest, mainly on Slater's efforts, but OSU went ahead 8-7 with 15:27 to go in the half and never trailed from that point on. Before the Frosh even scored again on a lay-in by Jackson, they found themselves trailing by ten.

Rebounding from a 36-21 half-time deficit, Oregon outscored the Rooks 11-5 in the first five and a half minutes of the second half to close the gap to nine, forcing the Rooks to call a time out. OSU came out of the huddle with an inspired defense, held the Ducklings without a field goal for the next eight minutes and allowed them only four for the remainder of the game, and meanwhile outscored them 32-12 to take the win going away.

27-Point Lead

Rook coach Bill Harper, remembering the 76-56 defeat his players at Eugene a week earlier, kept his starters in the game until OSU had a 27-point lead with 2:41 to play. The last Rook first-stringers left the game with 38 seconds left in the game.

Oregon State hit a surprising .519 from the field, 15-29 in the

first half and 13-25 in the second period. A week earlier at McArthur Court, they hit only 19 to 57 for .333.

The Frosh, meanwhile, hit their season low in shooting.

Lack of height in the Frosh line-up hurt, as the Rooks out-rebounded Oregon by an overwhelming margin.

OSU's Larry Webber claimed honors as game's high scorer with 18 points. He was closely followed by Tim Perkins, who had 17.

Slater was high for the Frosh with 13. Leonard Jackson had 10 and Brosterhous 9.

Oregon Soccer Team

Oregon remained undefeated in Portland Soccer League play Sunday with a 3-0 win over St. Patricks on the intramural field.

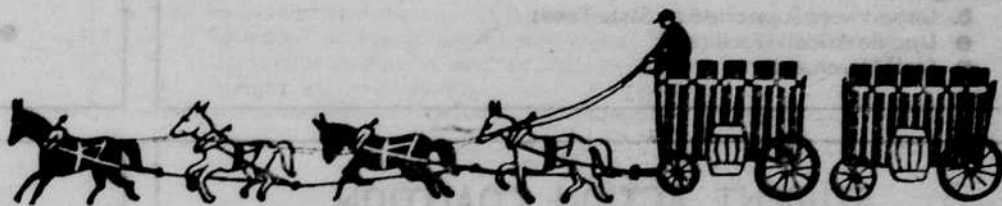
Sunday's match was a reversal of previous meets, as the Ducks took an early lead on John Morgan's tally after a scramble in front of the Portland club's net.

Oregon's record is now 2-0-1 in the second half after winning the Portland League first half with a 4-0-1 mark.

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Too Many 'Ifs'

As Coach Art Keith said after the match, "You don't win on ifs."

IF the outcome had been different in four key matches, Oregon might have pulled off the upset of the season and defeated Oregon State, reigning AA-WU champion for the last eight years, in a wrestling match.

As it turned out, Oregon earned ties in two of those key matches, lost the other two, and lost the match 26-13.

The four key matches:

• The 123 - pound division where Oregon's Terry Hileman tied Merritt Davis, runner-up in the AA-WU Tourney's 123 class for the last two years. "Terry came close to winning the match said Keith (the score was 6-6). "I said at the end of last season, he was the most improved wrestler. This match shows that he's picking up where he left off."

• 145, where the Ducks' Masashi Saito, a 130-pounder, lost 2-1 to Beaver Steve Woods. Saito, much smaller than his opponent, lost when the referee penalized him a point for intentionally going off the mat to avoid a takedown. "It was a

judgment call," said Keith. "In my judgment it wasn't a correct one."

• 167, where Oregon's George McNair, ahead 6-1 at one point, lost 11-10. "George and I were both disappointed with his performance. Of course he's been out with an injury, but that isn't an excuse. He just didn't catch fire."

• 191, where Tim Wilmarth tied OSU's Tim DeJager 2-2. "If Tim had just 10 more seconds of riding time, he would have gotten one point and the win." (Riding time is the amount of time one wrestler is in control over the other.)

The two "name" wrestlers of the meet, Oregon's undefeated John Miller, and the Beavers' Jess Lewis performed as expected. Miller won by decision 13-0, and Lewis pinned previously unbeaten heavyweight Henry Muller in the first round.

Keith compared their wrestling styles. "I've known about Lewis for the last five years, when he won the Oregon A-2 Championship and placed sixth in the World Games. He's real aggressive and goes for the pin. Miller's not a pinner. He'll try to decision his man."
