

U.N. Postpones Korean Meeting

Frustrated in its search for a diplomatic solution, the U.N. Security Council put off indefinitely Monday another meeting on the crisis over North Korea's seizure of the USS Pueblo.

Aga Shahi of Pakistan, president of the 15-nation council, announced a meeting set for Monday afternoon was canceled in order to enable consultations to continue "on an urgent basis."

He made the announcement after meeting privately with the 10 nonpermanent members of the council and others. Among them was Platon D. Morozov, the Soviet delegate.

In South Korea, U.S. troops drove back North Korean infiltrators along the Korean armistice line again early Monday.

Shooting occurred along the demilitarized zone for the eighth straight day.

And with the North Koreans giving no ground in the crisis over the Pueblo, the Pentagon said it was strengthening U.S. air power in the Far East with an unspecified number of planes.

South Korea was also increasing its preparedness, announcing that "quick reaction" army units would be stationed along routes frequently used by Red infiltrators from the North.

The White House said Monday a number of diplomatic channels "are active at this time" in the quest for a peaceful solution to the Pueblo crisis.

At the same time press secretary George Christian said Johnson spent much of the weekend in meetings and consultation involving the crisis. He said these White House meetings would continue.

The press aide noted activity in the U.N. Security Council and added:

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"There are a number of other channels which are available to us and are active at this time. It wouldn't be desirable to discuss these."

At the United Nations, a well-placed diplomatic source suggested that while the council might take no specific action on the crisis, its debate and private consultations could lead to contacts elsewhere and a peaceful settlement.

North Korea again appeared antagonistic toward any U.N. role in a settlement. The North Korean newspaper Redong Shinmoon repeated a government statement that it would not recognize any U.S. resolution "concocted to cover up U.S. imperialist aggression."

It said the U.S. decision to bring the issue before the Security Council was "like a thief shouting 'stop that thief!'"

Soviet Premier Kosygin, speaking in India, said there was no doubt that the Pueblo intruded into North Korean waters, and he declared that the United States and North Korea must settle the matter themselves.

Kosygin's remarks indicated that the Soviet Union would continue to spurn U.S. requests that it intervene in the dispute.

A suggestion from members of Kosygin's entourage that the Pueblo and her crew might be exchanged for North Korean infiltrators captured in the South was rejected by a South Korean Foreign Ministry spokesman as "outrageous and nonsensical."

Psychologist Analyzes Drugs Relation to Pain

Psychology professor Gerald Davison of Stoneybrook University lectured here at the University Monday on research he recently conducted on drugs effects.

Davison devoted his lecture to explaining the procedure, data and results of his research.

The guinea pigs of the experiment were divided into two groups. The first group was given a placebo which they were led to believe would increase their resistance to pain. The other group was given drugs.

The psychologist attempted to answer two questions. First, how soon could a person feel the effects of pain, and second, how long could a person tolerate the effects of pain.

Davison said each group had electric shocks administered to them and the results were measured on a skin sensitivity scale. Results showed that the group under drugs were less sensitive. However, in measuring the tolerance, Davison felt that the results may not be conclusive because of the possibility that

Color Won't Change

Minister Focuses on Race

"The inescapable problem of the Negro today is the color of his skin and this won't be changed even in a million years," said the Negro, Canadian minister, Frank Summers, in a speech last night, sponsored by the EMU Speakers and Debate Committee.

The minister attempted to discover just what the problem was in the United States that was causing unrest, and how it could be solved. "Individual attitudes towards other individuals cause the problems encountered throughout the world today," said Summers.

"You can't legislate away people's attitudes nor can you theorize them away. Education and solving the economic problems are a start, but they are not enough. The problem is deeper than that, it is part of his soul," he said.

"Is the Communist Party the fly in the ointment?" asked Summers. He added that people tend to over simplify the problem by blaming everything on the Communists.

"Are sophisticated teenagers part of a well-planned overthrow of the United States and its law and order? Communists exploit any reform movement. It is not just peculiar to America."

Another problem, the minister stated, was that of a white person cautioning the Negro not to rock the boat, have patience, and look at what you have achieved so far.

some of the people being experimented upon might have been trying to play he-man roles.

Davison hopes to answer the question of toleration by pursuing his research in the opposite direction. He plans to tell the group receiving the placebo that it will decrease their resistance, instead of increasing their resistance.

This he hopes would point to some definite results.

Davison did his undergraduate work at Harvard University, studied in Europe on a Fulbright Scholarship, did graduate work at Stanford University and has done other work in clinical psychology at a clinic in Palo Alto.

Flu Causes Duncan To Postpone Speech

Robert Duncan, candidate for the Democratic nomination for U.S. Senator from Oregon, has postponed his scheduled speaking appearance today because of influenza.

He had been slated to speak at 7:45 p.m. in 123 Science.

The talk will now be some time later in the week. The specific time and place will be announced later.

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"The Negro doesn't look at how far he has come, but rather at how far he has to go. Is the history of the U.S. one of patience and waiting? No, it was a lawless rebellion against a legitimate government."

"The American Negro wants to be part of the great American dream, without being shoved off into some corner. When he gets excited he becomes treasonous."

Returning to the theme of individual attitudes the minister stated that religion will never accomplish the job. Religion itself has caused much worldwide violence, and can never serve as an answer to violence.

"The Catholics won't open the churches because they fear the inter-marriage of the races. The other rationalization they use is that Negroes worship in a way different from whites."

"The Negro has no born desire to marry a white, and an argument that implies that the children of the mixed couple will never be accepted is false. For the lighter a Negro's skin the less the color barrier."

Negroes have as many varying religious views as does a white, and they can learn to adapt, he said. Certain social stereotypes have set-up barriers around clergymen stated Summers.

He continued, "Communism is no answer to achieve peace, because people will still fight, there will still be racism, and classes are a natural phenomenon."

"Socialism is not the answer, and capitalism is certainly not."

"All people must become individually involved," he said.
