Salisbury made front-page headlines throughout the country with New York Times reports of his U.S. State Department-approved stay in North Vietnam in December, 1966, and January, 1967.

Graduate Advocates Collective Bargaining

Collective bargaining may be the only effective mechanism open to graduate students who wish to change their servile University position, Joseph Fashing, graduate student in sociology and newly elected president of the Graduate Student Council, said Tuesday.

He emphasized that graduate students must organize and use all the power equalizing techniques of a union to affect the change.

"The graduate student is expected to hold a position of great responsibility within the university, but his position in terms of status, power and salary remains servile. There is no hope of reform coming from the faculty," he stated.

"Therefore," says Fashing, "graduate students must consolidate their power and adopt the tactics of organized labor as leverage mechanisms for change."

"If all the graduate student teaching assistants and researchers were to strike, change would occur," he said. "This is basically," Fashing concluded, "an attempt to gain the rewards justly due graduate students."

Members of the audience commented that speaking of collective bargaining seemed useless when it seemed impossible to organize the graduate students at all.

After all, they pointed out, if no more than 17 can be bothered to come and hear about collective bargaining then how will they ever be moved to action?

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
