Student Loans Frozen

The state-guaranteed Student Loan Program has been frozen for a month by the State Scholarship Commission, said Dean Francis Nickerson of the Department of Financial Aids Wednesday.

Word went out to all lending institutions not to forward any more loan applications for SSC approval after 11 a.m. Jan. 29.

Applications that have already cleared the State Commission office will be completed, according to the dean, but the Financial Aids office has no way of determining what loans this includes.

The freeze is to be in effect until March 1. It is an effort by the Scholarship Commission, said Nickerson, to conserve its funds in hope that they will not run completely out of money prior to July 1, which is begin-

ning of the new year for the state system.

A few checks will continue to come in from banks where applications had already cleared the SSC.

Nickerson suggested that any student for whom a loan is critical should come to the Financial Aids office in Emerald Hall to see if further help can be obtained from some other source.

Nickerson added that the \$102,000 received last week by the Financial Aids Department represents only the final payment on money budgeted to that department last summer.

The dean said that many more students had been asking for financial help since an Emerald article publicized the arrival of the money.

Nickerson emphasized that this does not represent new

money. The money was due last November, but Congress did not appropriate it until now. The department already had the \$102,000 budgeted in, as it had been authorized to spend the money by the government.
