Doves Host Anti-War Ball

CORVALLIS (AP)—An anti-war group at Oregon State University plans to hold an anti-military ball Friday in the Memorial Union—a building dedicated to American war dead.

The Student-Faculty Committee to End the War in Vietnam has scheduled the event one day before the annual military ball put on by the campus ROTC.

"We see it as a parody of the military ball and hope it will get people thinking about the significance of what's in back of the military philosophy," said Mike Papadopoulos, a math professor and a member of the anti-war committee.

"The dance and program will be within the ground rules of the university," he said, "but some people question why we should have this kind of a ball

while the boys are dying in Vietnam."

Controversy over the anti-military ball has been going on in the OSU student newspaper, the Barometer.

Jeanne Ewalt, the managing editor, said in a letter to the editor that it seems strange that the antiwar committee would choose the Memorial Union for the event.

"They should either name the dance something else or have it in another building," she wrote. Larry Austin, the editor, said the student-faculty committee "has every right to use the Memorial Union facilities for this event."

The MU has scheduled another dance for Friday night—this one in Gill Coliseum. The feeling is that students should

have some other choice for recreation that night than the anti-military ball.

Austin wrote in an editorial today that it is unfair for the MU to charge rent to one group, the anti-military ball people, and then compete with it by sponsoring another event on the same night.

Council Debates Withdrawal Time

Ideas for changing in the University's class withdrawal policy were debated in the Student-Faculty Council Monday.

Although no concrete action was taken proposing changes in University's system of late withdrawal from classes, the committee decided that a change was necessary and that research work on the problem should be done.

G. H. Wannier, professor of physics, suggested that the present three week withdrawal period was not long enough and that the time limit for dropping classes should be set at six weeks. He said that this would give the student time enough to discover if he was "over his head or not."

A resolution was submitted to the committee by Irma Trommlitz that the decision whether to drop a class or not should be a student responsibility. This resolution also stated that a student should be able to withdraw from a class until finals week. However, the committee took no action on the resolution.

The committee will meet again in three weeks to make a recommendation on the issue to send to the faculty.

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Packwood Enters Oregon Senate Race

State Representative Robert Packwood became the first Republican to announce his candidacy for the U.S. senate seat held by Wayne Morse in news conferences Tuesday in Portland, Eugene, Medford, and Klamath Falls.

In his prepared statement, Packwood decried a lack of confidence in the American people because "they have been told too often that their problems are too big to be solved by anyone but the federal government."

Political speculators expect Packwood to win the Republican nomination and face either Wayne Morse or Robert Duncan in the general election.

According to Associated Press reports, Packwood told a news conference that it made no difference whether he opposed Morse or Duncan.

He said if he opposed Morse he would have less money available, but "I can put together people. We'll make up for lack of money in zealous volunteers."

He predicted that he would have 30,000 volunteers campaigning around the state.

Packwood said that he had found less concern in Oregon over the Vietnam war than on such issues as crime in the streets, inflation and air and water pollution.

On Vietnam, he said that he

believed we were right in getting into the war but that we should make clear that we will at some time get out so that the South Vietnamese will take over the war.

ASUO Sponsors Teacher Awards

To promote and encourage outstanding teaching the ASUO is sponsoring teaching assistant awards in the form of \$250 grants this year.

Any graduate student pursuing an advanced degree, charged with part time classroom instruction and not holding faculty rank is eligible for an award.

The Teaching Assistant Awards Committee will use the spring and winter Course Survey Bulletin and a brochure from UCLA concerning similar awards there as criteria for procedures in the contest.

Comments from department heads will be considered in the contest, and in the finals, the teaching assistants will be observed in their classrooms.

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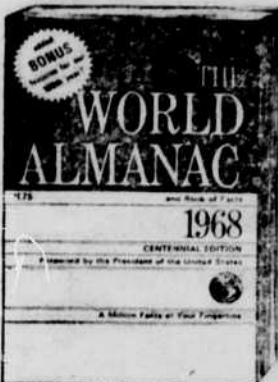
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Directors Explain Overseas Study

Richard Burton as Doctor Faustus

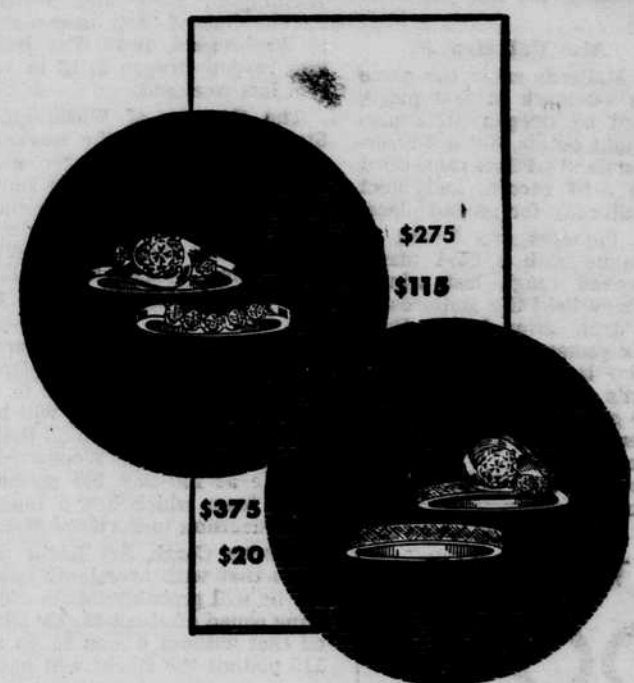
