

Once-Beaten Ducklings Face PSC, Washington

Oregon's once-beaten Frush are looking ahead to Saturday afternoon's basketball encounter with the Washington Pups, but they can't overlook tonight's game with the Portland State Vikings.

PSC provided some surprises last Friday in Portland when they hit over 50 per cent from the field in the first half before falling 108-77. They'll take on the Ducklings in a 6 p.m. preliminary before tonight's Oregon-Washington State varsity contest.

The Vikings are led by 6-0 forward Dennis Hartman, a sophomore from Tillamook, who scored 31 against the Frush in last week's game. Guard Chris Park, 6-4, and 6-2 forward Glenn McClelland hit well from outside, scoring 17 and 19 points respectively.

PSC's biggest weak point is height. Center John Oreshovich, a freshman from Portland's Cleveland High, is the tallest man on the team at 6-3.

Tom Trebelhorn, a 5-11 playmaker, is the fifth member of the PSC starting lineup. Guards Terry Hauck and Bob Armstrong will see a lot of action as part of the reserve unit.

The Vikings carry a 3-17 record into tonight's game.

Washington's Pups, however, have a 10-8 record, including a 91-76 defeat at the hands of the Ducklings last January. They've lost to the Oregon State Beavers, who dealt the Frush their only loss, and edged St. Martin's JV's, 71-66. Oregon knocked off St. Martin's 90-83.

The Pups came up with their biggest point output of the season, 106, in a Feb. 17 loss to the Univ. of Puget Sound Frush. UPS scored 106.

Washington is averaging 75.5 points per game. Their big guns are 6-8 center Marc Wallace from Ferris High in Spokane and 6-0 guard Mike Truger from Greencastle, Indiana. Truger scored 24 against the Frush in Seattle and Wallace put in 22.

Other Pup starters will probably be 6-2 forward Cam Smith, a good outside shooter, recruited from Laguna Beach, Calif.; guard Dave Willenborg; and forward Dave Minihan, second tallest man on the team at 6-4.

On the Oregon side of the picture, 6-5 forward Bill Drenth, who hasn't been shooting well the last couple of weeks, has looked sharp in practice, according to Frush assistant coach Jim Carille. Drenth's father is going to be coming up from San Jose, Calif., to attend Dad's Weekend, according to Carille, and Bill wants to play well.

Center Stan Love, however, still has to be regarded as the major Frush scoring threat. Love has scored 438 points in 25 games for the Ducklings this season, a 24.5 average. He needs 46 points this weekend to clinch the Frush record for the highest season scoring average, a 22.3 mark set by former All-American Jim Barnett during the 1962-63 season.

Love is hitting an amazing 622 from the field, and leads the team with a 12.1 rebounding average. Drenth, who pulled in 31 eurus last weekend, has

a 10.6 average in that category, and 6-7 forward—John Green is collecting them at a 10.3 pace.

Green had a fantastic weekend in Portland last Friday and Saturday. He scored 20 one night and 30 the other, hitting on 14 of 16 attempts from the field against Portland Community College on the latter evening. He is now the third Duckling hitting better than 50 per cent from the field with a .509 mark. Drenth is shooting .527 with a 17.6 average. Green's scoring average has reached 12.3.

Guards Larry Jackson and Carlton Slater have been looking good in recent weeks, as has reserve guard Rick Branderhous. Jackson is averaging 12.8 a game, and 5-9 fireball Slater is hitting 11.7 with numerous ball thefts and assists. Branderhous has been seeing nearly as much action as the starters. Just recovering from a shoulder injury suffered during football season, he's hitting at a 4.1 per game pace.

Forward Marty James and center Mike Williams will see a lot of action in reserve positions for the Ducklings this weekend.

IM Office Picks Track Finalists

The intramural office has announced the finalists in its 1968 IM track meet. Finals are to take place on Tuesday, March 5, on the IM track.

Fred Buller of Stafford registered the top preliminary time in the 70-yard hurdles with an 8.9. DeBusk's Bob Newland had a 7.8 in the 75-yard dash, and William Pink of Collier registered a 3:23.1 in the 1200-yard (3.4 mile) run. Top 330-yard time was 38.0 by Bob Barclay of Chi Phi.

Phi Delta Theta fraternity's team in the 6x75-yard relay finished in 51.6 for the best time so far in that event. Mike Williams of Parsons put the shot 48 feet, 8 inches, and Rocky Pamplin of Dunn leaped 20 feet, 7 1/2 inches to take the long jump lead.

Drill Team Adds Color To ROTC Ceremonies

Tonight University students and visitors will see the Army ROTC Drill Team perform some of their coordinated maneuvers during half-time at the Washington State basketball game.

The Drill Team, a unit of the University Army ROTC program, often provides honor guards and acts as a show unit when needed.

According to Doug Malkasian, student leader of the Drill Team, the group practices for four hours a week learning how to use their rifles in unison according to the army drill manual. The basic goal, Malkasian said, "is to get the mass effect of everyone doing the same thing."

Members of the Drill Team are recruited mostly from the Freshman class of ROTC. The team currently consists of 21 members.

Main advantages to students on the drill team is that it gives good experience and extra drill training. Malkasian said the first goal of the unit is high morale, since it is important for members to "think as a unit and have pride."

Each year the Army Drill Team competes with the Air Force team for a revolving trophy. The Air Force currently holds the trophy, but Malkasian said the Army is training to win it back.

The drill team provides color at many ROTC events and ceremonies.

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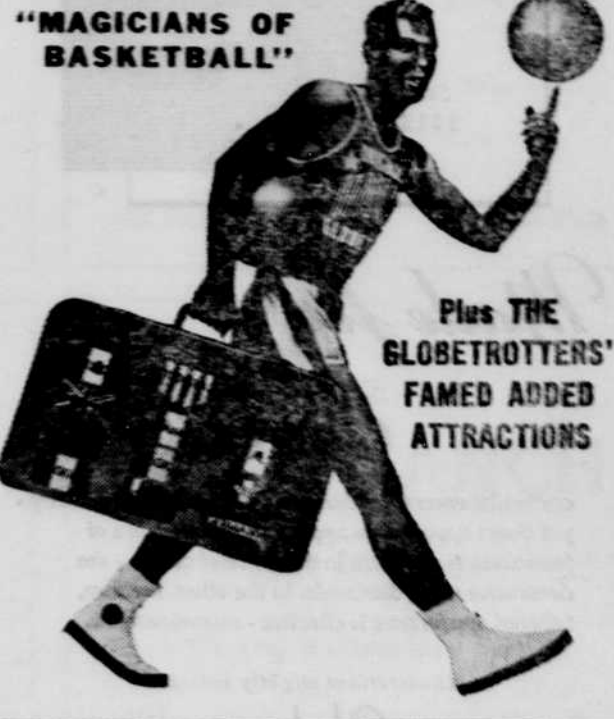


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
