

# Coeds' Career Study Scheduled at Center

Richard Young, member of the University Counseling Center, will be offering two eight-week Career Appraisal and Planning Program (CAPP) groups beginning Monday and Tuesday.

Each of the two groups will be limited to six freshmen female students and will meet on alternate days.

The Monday-Wednesday group will meet from 3 to 5 p.m. and the Tuesday-Thursday group will meet from 2 to 4 p.m.

CAPP is designed to help the student with the initial phase of career planning, namely self-understanding. Career plans can be best formulated when based on an understanding of one's self, said Young.

Through group study, appraisal and individual counseling, CAPP will assist the student

in gaining clues and insights related to their achievements, abilities, personality, values, interests, etc., according to the counselor.

All group members will be required to attend two two-hour sessions during each of the first two weeks, and one two-hour session during each of the last six weeks.

Standardized tests dealing with abilities, personality, motivation and interest, will be administered only during these class periods. Each person will be required to pay a \$7.50 testing fee.

# Curriculum Head Keys Communication

"Curriculum is important to every student and faculty member on this campus. Discussion of it must be dynamic, fluid and broad in scope."

Marv Benson, ASUO Curriculum Committee chairman, believes that, though changes in curriculum are necessary, direct communication among fac-

ulty and students must first be initiated.

At the committee's Tuesday meeting, Benson emphasized this communication as part of the committee's purpose. "It's a channel for exchange of ideas across department and student-faculty lines," he said. Though the committee has no authority to initiate legislation, it is hoped all interested students and faculty members participate in the open discussions.

A second function of the committee in the next two months will be to review progress reports from department curriculum committee members on actions and proposals considered during the year.

If a grant proposal by the Committee on Educational Experimentation, Innovation and Improvement (CEEII) succeeds, funds will be provided for a summer study of the need for a curriculum center at the University.

position in the armed forces." The resolution said, "The continuation of student deferments unfairly channels poor people and people of minority races into less desirable endeavors, occupations and activities — and more quickly."

The resolution is to be forwarded to President Johnson, Selective Service director Lewis Hershey, members of the Oregon Congressional delegation, and the National AAUP.

The second resolution dealt with students and faculty members who cannot, as a matter of conscience, accept induction in the armed forces for service in the Vietnam war.

The legislation said, "We call on the relevant public agencies, and especially on educational institutions, to devote their strongest efforts toward retaining the potential of these young men for useful public service with all rights of citizenship."

"Specifically, we call on the Oregon State System of Higher Education to define the status of faculty and students affected by the Vietnam war within the context of this statement."

Included in the personnel actions which the measure mentioned, the AAUP listed admission to employment as staff members, promotion and tenure, admission to student status, and eligibility for fellowship, assistantships and scholarships.
