Debate Team Places Fifth

Gary Roberts and Gregory Mowe, both University students, have tied for fifth place in the National Invitational Debate Tournament of the American Forensics Association in Brooklyn, N.Y.

The tie is the highest the University has ranged in recent years at a national tournament. The last time a debate team ranked as high was in 1965 when they placed in the top ten at West Point.

Roberts and Mowe reached the octa-finals at the national tournament. They were the top ranked team with four wins and four losses.
