Indians Bomb UO, 11-3

PALO ALTO, (SPECIAL) — The Oregon Ducks kept pace with heavily favored Stanford for five-and-one-half innings here Tuesday, but the roof fell in the sixth inning as the Indians scored four unearned runs and went on to post an 11-3 decision.

The game was knotted until the sixth, Oregon's Jon Wheeler and the Indians' Sandy Vance locked in a 3-3 duel.

Stanford's Ron Shotts singled up-the-middle to start the inning. He then went to second on a sacrifice bunt and to third on a fly ball to center, the second out of the inning. Vance, called by many the best college pitcher in the nation, hit a ground ball to shortstop Larry Hanson who fielded the ball cleanly but threw wide to Scott Cress at first base.

Wheeler Pulled

The error gave the Indians a 4-3 lead, and with Vance at second on the error plus the top of the line-up coming up, assistant coach Jack Roche pulled a perspiration soaked Wheeler. At this point, Roche inserted ace left-hander Mike Nicksic in the line-up.

Nicksic walked Mark Marquess, a first team All-America first baseman last year, and was abruptly replaced by right-hander Fred Cardwell.

Cardwell gave up another walk to load the bases, and before he was able to get the final out on an interference call, Stanford pushed three more runs across on a wild pitch and Bob Gallagher's two-run single.

Oregon had started the scoring in the first when Larry Hand ripped a Vance pitch down the leftfield line for a double and moved to third on the ensuing play.

Hanson delivered an infield single to bring in Hand, moved to third when Colby Howe's ground-rule double bounced over the centerfield fence, and scored on a wild pitch.

Russ Tweet's double for Stanford brought in two second inning runs, one unearned, and tied the game, 2-2.

But the Ducks went ahead in the fourth.

Hand Starts Rally

With two outs, Hand reached first on an infield single, stole second and went to third on the catcher's throwing error. He remained on third when the umpire missed Bob Boone's hidden ball pick-off, and scored on a second wild pitch by Vance.

The Ducks had runners on third base three other times, during the game, but each time left them stranded.

Stanford knotted the game in the fifth when Marquess led off with a double to left, moved to third on a wild pitch, and scored on Boone's single in the hole between third and short.

As if the four run sixth hadn't iced the victory, Chuck Williams hit a 380-foot home run to left-center off Cardwell to score two seventh inning runs.

Boone's second double of the game brought in two more Stanford runs, these off Fred Masar, in the eighth.

The Ducks, now 3-6 in league play, and stranded in fifth

Duck Shellmen Stroke By OSU

The Oregon junior - varsity crew captured its first competitive win over the Oregon State crew during the fifth annual Corvallis Regatta last Sunday.

Racing upstream on the Willamette river over a 2,000 meter course the Ducks shot into an early lead and held on in the last 200 meters to win by a full length.

The Oregon Frosh crew was beaten by what coach Don McCarty called "the best Frosh crew OSU has ever put on the water."

The Ducks and Beavers will finish their dual competitive competition racing for the year on St. Mary's river near Corvallis Saturday.

Frosh Defeat Rooks, Nall Leads 10-5 Win

Gary Nall slammed a single, triple and a home run while driving in three runs to help the Oregon Frosh win their fifth straight and take a 10-5 decision from the Oregon State Rooks.

Nall's three hits upped his average to .450 and spearheaded Duckling rallies in the third, fifth and sixth innings.

The Rooks drew first blood when two singles and a sacrifice scored a lone run in the second.

Oregon tied the score in the bottom half of the same frame when Bob Main reached first on a fielder's choice and scored when a single by catcher Don Knapp got by the OSU right fielder. Main came home and Knapp went to second as the right fielder raced after the errant horsehide.

Oregon broke the deadlock with a big four-run rally in the third. Earle Wicklund singled to start off the inning preserving his ten-game hitting streak. Nall then smashed a three-bagger to deep left-center scoring Wicklund; Dick Whitman then brought Nall in with a double.

A two-bagger by Tom Graham, the fourth straight hit of the inning, scored Whitman who eventually came home on a groundout.

The Rooks managed single runs in the next two frames but the Frosh put it out of reach with scores in the fifth and sixth innings. Nall lead off the fifth with his third hit of the afternoon and scored on Whitman's double.

Mike Balkovich tapped a slow infield roller and reached first safely when the shortstop threw to third in an unsuccessful attempt to get Whitman.

While the next man was at bat "Balk" purposely got caught in a rundown between first and second. Whitman took off from third and slid under the catcher's tag to score when second baseman George Nelson threw the ball home.

Nall figured again in the Frosh scoring when he clubbed a ball over the hedge in right center with one man on to score two more in the sixth.

Oregon State threatened in the seventh when Duckling hurler Greg Hollen walked the first two men.

Other individual scores for Oregon included Thurston Gilchrist, 535; Bob Godon, 613; Ed Margus, 559; and Jim Parker, 579.

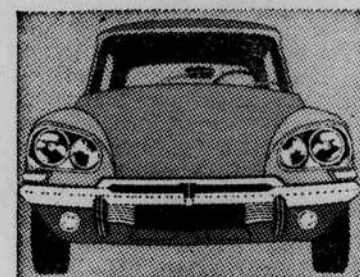
This Saturday the bowlers travel to Pendleton Lanes in Pendleton for a match with Blue Mountain Community College.
