

Columbia Opens Doors Amid Chaos, Boycotts

NEW YORK (AP)—Besieged Columbia University reopened its doors Monday for the first time in ten days amid chaos and controversy, and a two-century-old tradition of formal classroom teaching apparently ended for the rest of the semester.

Columbia College, the liberal arts school and the university's oldest and largest unit, decided Sunday to end formal classes for the rest of the semester, almost four weeks ahead of its official end, May 29.

Some other units of the university were expected to follow

Columbia College's lead.

The confusion was heightened by rebel students who renewed their two-week old protest by calling for a boycott of classes. Minor scuffling broke out at several spots this morning as staff members and unsympathetic students walked through picket lines set up to enforce the boycott.

The students originally made two demands: That the university stop building a gymnasium on park land, and that it refuse to allow use of the school for a government "defense analysis" program.

The gym construction was halted, but that apparent victory for the rebel students has obviously not ended their protest.

The rebels now claim to have the support of 5,000 students for their boycott. They issued a bulletin today listing more than 50 "liberation" classes in such subjects as "avant-garde literature," "imperialism," "corporate liberalism" and "Columbia and the warfare state."

In a report ordered by Mayor John V. Lindsay, the city police department said its men faced large-scale violence from the demonstrators last week.

"Police were punched, bitten and kicked with many attempts made to kick policemen in the groin," the report said. "A pattern was seen in the use of females to bite and kick the policemen."

"In some buildings, demonstrators hurled furniture, bottles and miscellaneous objects at the police."

The report said the university grossly underestimated the numbers of the sit-ins and "the extent of the involvement of the faculty in sympathy with the students."

The report's figure of non-student arrests was at variance with a higher ratio given by Dr. Grayson Kirk, president of Columbia.

Kirk defended Sunday his summoning of police to break up the sit-in and said he will not resign under fire.

Students Elect Dean President

GUNNISON, Colo. (AP) — "Since he has all the power we thought he might as well have the job," said one youth after Western State College students elected Olaf Kjoness, dean of students, as president of the student body.

The students mounted a write-in campaign after complaining they have little real power in college decision-making. Kjoness, who has been dean of students for more than 20 years, collected 87 per cent of the vote in balloting by about 1,000 of the school's 2,500 students.

Student candidates withdrew from the election Sunday. Kjoness said he expects the Student Council to declare the election null and void.
