University Personnel Add to Encyclopedia

Seventeen persons affiliated with the University are among 33 from the Pacific Northwest who have contributed articles to the new Encyclopedia of the Social Sciences.

The encyclopedia contains a collection of essays by eminent specialists on topics ranging over the entire area of social sciences, and is the first work of its kind to be published since 1935.

Perry Morrison, professor of librarianship at Oregon, said in an editorial review in the fall issue of the "Pacific Northwest Library Association Quarterly" the "sort of bland comprehensiveness and gray balance prized in general encyclopedias was neither desired nor achieved in this one."

"The device used to mitigate the effect of this specialization was to place at least two articles from different fields of study under each entry."

Summarizing the encyclopedia, Morrison calls it a "work of surpassing excellence which should be in all libraries."

European Flights Offered by Center

The International Education Center (IEC) is offering two group flights to Europe for the summer of 1969.

The cost of the round trip flight is \$309 inclusive. Last year's cost was \$373.

Travelers taking this flight to Europe will meet in Portland where bus transportation will take them to Vancouver, B.C. From there the flight will fly directly to London.

The flight will leave on June 14 and return from Amsterdam, Netherlands on Sept. 20.

Another shorter flight, leaving on the same day, will return from London on Aug. 6.

University students, faculty, staff and members of their immediate families are eligible for the flight. Tickets are sold on a first come first serve basis.

As there are only a limited number of seats, the flights are filling up, according to Mary Brennan, IEC director. She said there may possibly be a third flight.

Brita Butler, flight director of IEC, will accompany the flight.

Four programs, flight applications and further information are available in the IEC office, room 319 EMU.

Studies Reveal Most Transfers Receive Degrees

Three out of five students who transfer from Oregon community colleges to four-year state institutions continue their studies until they receive their baccalaureate degree.

This was brought out recently in a report to the Committee on Academic Affairs of the State Board of Higher Education.

The study encompassed 128 fulltime students who transferred with junior standing, dating from 1964. Results showed 76 students graduated within three years after transfer from a community, and 43 dropped out for one reason or another. The remaining nine students were still enrolled at the time of the study; four of these have since graduated.

Vice Chancellor for Academic Affairs Miles Romney, who presented the report to the board's committee, said results of this statewide study compare favorably with a national study that shows 62 per cent of junior college transfers were granted baccalaureate degrees within three years after transfer. The Oregon figure is 59.4 per cent.

Romney's report also shows the State System institutions are accepting an increasing number of community college transfer students every year. In fall term 1965, the number of transfers was 277. By fall of 1968, only three years later, the total had almost quadrupled to 1,062.
