

Classes in Dance Offered by DCE

The Department of Dance, in co-operation with the Division of Continuing Education (DCE) at the University, will offer three classes in dance for children and adults as a public service this term.

Teaching the classes in children's creative dance, children's ballet and adult modern dances will be Mrs. Terrie Hayes, director of the children's program at the University since 1967.

Mrs. Hayes is currently working on a master's degree in dance at the University.

Registration for the dance classes, payable at the first class, will be \$12 for children and \$15 for adults. All sessions will be in the Gerlinger Studio.

Children's creative dance class sessions will be held Jan. 11 through March 15 on Saturday morning at 9:30 and will include basic techniques to de-

velop body coordination, control and experience in the dynamics of movement. Children age six and over are eligible.

Children's ballet, open to those age eight and up, will be held at 10:30 a.m. each Saturday, Jan. 11 through March 15. The sessions will include basic ballet vocabulary and basic ballet techniques in addition to an understanding of rhythmic patterns.

Adult classes, open to both men and women, will include modern dance techniques which contribute to total fitness and conditioning. Time will also be spent on compositional problems and creative improvisation. These sessions will meet at 7:30 p.m. each Monday, Jan. 6 through March 10.

The children's classes will be held for one-hour periods, and the adult classes for two hours.

Motions Result In Sirhan Delay

LOS ANGELES (AP)—Sirhan Bishara Sirhan appeared in court today for the start of his trial on charges of murdering Sen. Robert Kennedy but the session was adjourned until Wednesday after a series of defense motions, one of them an unsuccessful request for a 30-day delay.

The 24-year-old Jordanian was in court about an hour and a half—part of the time in a closed meeting with attorneys for both sides and Superior Judge Herbert Walker.

Walker adjourned the trial to 2 p.m. Wednesday after deny-

ing the request for the month's delay and asking that one of the motions be made in writing.

Sirhan appeared calm as the proceedings began. He entered the heavily guarded courtroom wearing a grey suit and blue tie, sat down at the long counsel table and waved to his attorneys. He later was ordered taken back to his cell.

The move for a 30-day delay came when Grant Cooper, one of three defense attorneys, asked that Sirhan's plea of not guilty be set aside "for the sole and only purpose of making a motion to quash the indictment."

Judge Walker asked the motion be made in writing and Cooper said he would need additional time. "I would suggest a period of 30 days," he said. The judge denied this, saying "there is a great deal of expense and inconvenience involved. I feel we should move as expeditiously as possible."

Judge Walker also denied a plea for two separate juries, one to determine whether Sirhan is guilty or innocent and a second to determine the penalty if the defendant is convicted. He said Cooper could make the motion again at the end of the first part of the trial.

Training Offered In Communication

The University Counseling Center is offering a program, "Training in Human Relations," which will begin Monday and continue for nine weeks.

The training is designed for the student who wants to improve his skills in interpersonal relations.

"The training deals with informal communication within the group and is intended to increase the competence of individuals in communicating in small groups," according to the counseling center.

In the training sessions, individuals will work in small groups of eight to 12 members. An exercise to focus attention on communicative skills will begin each two-hour session and individuals will have an opportunity to practice the skill within their group.

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Teachers Join Protest At Turbulent SF State

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — A noisy group of striking teachers and minority students picketed the entrance to San Francisco State College today, but students streamed through the line to classes.

One Chinese student scuffled with a Chinese picket and a Negro picket as police arrived, but classes appeared to be operating normally on a cold, foggy morning.

There was no major violence but police arrested five demonstrators on charges of intimidating nonstrikers and using obscenities.

Acting President S. I. Hayakawa questioned whether he could keep the school open in face of a strike by union teachers.

Another state college, at San Jose, faced a similar teacher's strike Wednesday.

"I don't know how I am going to stop them from closing the school," Hayakawa said of the striking American Federation of Teachers (AFT). "But I am going to try. I am not going to accept it closed by anyone."

The teachers support student strikers who have boycotted classes at the 18,000-student campus since Nov. 6. They also seek higher pay, more voice in college policy-making and official recognition.

Hayakawa was visibly shaken by the strike called Monday by the teachers union, representing 350 of the college's 1,100 faculty members. Until then, he had appeared optimistic since he became acting president Nov. 26.

The AFT set up picket lines in front of the college and at certain on-campus points Monday. But it wasn't until late in the day the union received strike sanctions from the San Francisco Labor Council.

The action hit other campus employees. The cafeteria closed at 2 p.m. when food handlers left their jobs. Some 150 other nonteaching union workers faced the prospect of crossing picket lines to reach their jobs.

At San Jose, 50 miles south, the college chapter of AFT received strike sanction Monday night from the Central Labor Council of Santa Clara County.

The union planned a strike Wednesday supporting its undisclosed demands and backing San Francisco State AFT mem-

bers. The San Jose AFT claims 275 members of a faculty of more than 1,200.

"A militant minority of the faculty has hitchhiked onto the militant students' violence-ridden strike for a vicious power grab," Hayakawa told newsmen. Later he met with college administrators, planning strategy to counter the strike.

"I have some ideas," he said. "Very few things are solely my decision."

Three hundred police were stationed on or near the campus. Hayakawa said he would keep officers patrolling school buildings the rest of the week.

The student strike, led by the

Black Students Union and the Third World Liberation Front—composed of other racial minority students—have made 15 demands of the college. They want, among other things, an autonomous black studies department, admission of all minority applicants regardless of academic qualifications and amnesty for all arrested or suspended during the strike.

Classes also resumed at nearby College of San Mateo. Seventy-five police were stationed on campus after a prevacation raid by a small group of students destroyed property, disrupted classes and attacked students and faculty.

Reagan Proposals Aim At Campus Disruptions

SACRAMENTO, Calif. (AP) — Gov. Ronald Reagan, offering California his 1969 program, called on the state legislature today to strike hard against campus turmoil by increasing penalties for students, nonstudents and faculty involved in disturbances.

And, he asked for new pornography controls and new weapons in the war against crime, including giving police authority to use electronic listening devices when a judge approves.

The speech was prepared for a joint session of the legislature where Republicans now hold narrow majorities in the Senate and Assembly.

Many of his plans for the third year of his term were spelled out in general terms, but Reagan was more specific when he talked about unrest on California's public college campuses.

"Such proposals, among other things, increase the legal pen-

alties for assaults on teachers and students, provide for the expulsion of students or the dismissal of teachers who interfere with the educational process and strengthen the trespass laws to keep trouble makers off the campus," he said.

Concert Cancelled Because of Illness

The concert featuring the duo-piano team of Alfons and Aloys Kontarsky scheduled for Thursday evening at the School of Music Recital Hall has been cancelled due to the illness of one of the brothers, who is hospitalized in Germany.

The concert was to have been the third in the Little Concert Series offered this season at the University.

Refunds for the single admission are being distributed at the main office of the EMU. A substitute concert will be offered later in the season.
