No arrests yet in knifing

No arrests have been made yet in connection with the Tuesday morning knife fight which left three University students injured, the Eugene Police Department said Wednesday.

A police lieutenant told the Emerald the police were continuing to investigate the incident

which occurred in the parking area between Bean and Hamilton dormitory complexes.

He said the police had nothing new to add to the description of the incident released Tuesday. According to the Tuesday account, several students were having a snowball fight about 12:45 a.m. when visitors carrying knives approached.

A fight ensued in which three of the students incurred minor injuries, the police reported. The head resident of the Bean complex then broke up the fight, and the assailants escaped before the police arrived.

Two of the injured students, Harry de Boer, counselor of Henderson Hall, and Mark

Swain, a resident of Henderson, were treated at the University infirmary and released. The third received only a superficial hand wound.

Several witnesses of the incident have told the Emerald that both Blacks and Whites were involved. Radio stations KEED and KPNW reported in their news broadcasts that the armed "visitors" were Blacks and that they attacked a White counselor.

However, officials in the University housing department have refused to comment, and the police lieutenant, when asked whether or not Blacks were involved, said he didn't want "to bring that racial thing into the business."

SDS reorganizes, seeks greater unity

"We must stop bickering and act." This call for unity, voiced by Dennis Stoval, set the tone of the SDS reorganization meet-

ing last Friday afternoon.

Stoval, one of four members urging action, said, "We are so fragmented half the time, we work against each other if we work at all." According to Bill Watson, "we work together or we swing separately from that famous tree."

Paul Gratz urged that SDS take a stand, raise it to the political level, educate people and act. He told the group to start identifying with the oppressed people of the world.

Howard Anderson called for the Peoples Liberation and a do-it-yourself, right now philosophy. "If White radicals want to work with the Black man they must lock arms for the Peoples Liberation," he said.

During discussion of problems of organization, Watson seemed to express the consensus. "We hope that we can all form the vanguard action to do what has to be done on this campus. Everyone doing everything together," he said.

Two main SDS objectives were agreed upon; removal of ROTC from campus and curtailment of recruiting on campus by companies such as Dow Chemical.

Senate to meet tonight

The ASUO Senate will meet at seven tonight in 101 EMU. Committee appointments were the only business on the agenda. Senate head Dan Allison said he knew of Wednesday.

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University Co-op Campaign Rules 1969

- I. Eligibility
 - A. All candidates must be Co-op members.
 - B. One (1) freshman will be elected for a one (1) year term.
Two (2) sophomores will be elected for two (2) year terms.
 - C. All candidates must have a cumulative grade point average of not less than 2.00.
- II. Nominations

Any Co-op member may nominate an eligible candidate at the annual meeting. A nominee does not need to be present.
- III. Election

Election shall be by membership card or other satisfactory proof of Co-op membership. The date and polling place(s) shall be announced at the annual meeting.
- IV. Promotional Material
 - A. No signs shall be permitted on the buildings of the University of Oregon, except the dormitories.
 - B. Posters may be placed in any residence hall, subject to the approval of the particular living organization.
 - C. Posters may be placed on specified places in and on the Co-op building. (Bulletin board upstairs and downstairs, pillars on the outside, and brickwork on the outside.) The maximum size of poster used in and on the Co-op shall be 14"x22".
 - D. Any campaigning that violates any applicable law shall be prohibited.
 - E. Posters shall not appear until the day following the annual meeting.
 - F. No Emerald advertisements shall appear on the day of the election.
- V. Expenditures
 - A. Total campaign expenditures on the part of any candidate must not exceed \$25.00.
 - B. Each candidate shall prepare a list of expenditures, including reasonable estimates of the value of donated materials. This list must be turned in to the store manager by 5:00 p.m. of the day before the election and must be signed by the candidate. Successful write-in candidates must submit their lists by noon of the following day of the election. Candidates should be prepared to prove by receipt or otherwise that all statements are accurate.
- VI. Write-in Candidates
 - A. The first and last names must be reasonably correctly spelled for a vote to be valid.
 - B. All write-in candidates must conform to these rules.
- VII. Withdrawals

The names of all members nominated at the annual meeting shall appear on the ballot unless a written withdrawal is received by the vice-chairman of the board or the store manager—not less than two days before the election.
- VIII. Compliance
 - A. Each nominee or his agent will be furnished with a copy of rules, the Articles of Incorporation and the By-laws of the corporation at the annual meeting or soon after.
 - B. All candidates will sign a statement that binds them to compliance with these rules, the Articles of Incorporation, and the By-laws of the corporation. This statement must be received by the vice-chairman of the board or the store manager not less than two days before the election. Successful write-in candidates will have until noon of the day following the election.
- IX. Disqualification

A candidate may be disqualified by a vote of 5 members of the Board of Directors for infractions committed by himself or anyone acting on his behalf.
