

HB 1880 change includes trespass of public property

SALEM (Special) — A bill that hurried through the Oregon House with unusual speed and then slowed down in the Senate Education Committee may leave the committee amended to extend beyond the original intent of the bill.

House bill 1880, which aroused the concern of students and legislators for its speed in passage and content, may be amended to result in a public property trespass law.

The amended version of the bill would extend the right of the Governor to declare a state of emergency when a clear and present danger exists to all public property. The original bill limited the Governor to declaring the emergency to state college and university campuses.

The Senate Education has ordered the bill re-engrossed and will probably take action on it Wednesday. Monday the bill was introduced and discussed.

The proposed amendment requires the Governor to consult with the public official, such as the university president or other officer in charge of the state building involved, and the police before any emergency period is declared under the bill. The Governor would have to put the bill into effect before anyone could be prosecuted by it.

The public property would have to be described in the emergency proclamation and it would have to be publicized. Any person excluded from public property under the provisions of the amended bill would have priority in circuit court for review of their case.

Other action by the Legislature may liberalize punishment of marijuana violators. The new law would allow judges the option of treating the possession or use of marijuana as a felony or a misdemeanor. Present law provides for punishment as a felony. The bill has been passed by both houses unanimously.

The House approved a bill which could create a 15-member board of education to supervise all public education. The bill passed the House, State and Federal Affairs Committee despite objections from educators. The bill would become effective Jan. 1, 1970.

No action has been taken by either house on the plan.

Changes affect ASUO budget

The 1969-70 ASUO budget, including an amendment drastically altering University priorities, was approved Monday night by the ASUO Senate.

The amended budget was approved by a 23-3 vote.

Areas seriously affected by the amendment were the athletic department and the music department. Eleven other

departments were affected.

Four new areas emerged from the amendment: Ethnic Studies, budgeted at \$75,000; Conflict Center, \$25,000; Visiting Professor Program, \$18,000 and Ombudsman, \$10,000.

Money for the Ethnic Studies would go toward a center for the study of Blacks, Mexican Americans and American Indians. Funding would also be available for a scholarship pro-

gram. This area represents the highest increase in the budget.

Incidental fees available total \$1.17 million. The Fiscal Committee presented its proposed budget Thursday night. The amendment, which passed 20-6 originated Sunday in what one senator termed, "a sort of ad hoc committee."

"A number of people met last night (Sunday) to go over the material presented by the fiscal

committee which was very valuable. We got to talking about issues and a group of us came up with these proposals," Senator Tom English explained.

The total request of the committee was \$1,171,279. A total of \$1,162,880 is available, which means \$8,399 must be cut. In addition, \$23,045 for salaries and assessments must be included, calling for a total cut in the amendment committee's proposal of \$31,444. As of press time, no solution had been offered.

The amendment proposed:

- Athletic Department: Eliminating a requested \$249,000 request but supplying a \$100,000 reserve should the department not break even or make profits.

- Music: Decreasing the subsidy by \$8,150 dropping the budget from the proposed \$18,350 to \$10,200.

- EMU house: Cutting by \$5,000 providing an expense budget of \$111,694.

- EMU foods: Cutting expenses by \$2,500 and realizing a \$510,941 income.

- University programs: Increasing the budget by \$600, totaling \$10,900.

- WRA and Recreation Council: Eliminating WRA as a separate item, putting it under Recreation Council. The Council's budget now stands at \$25,215.

- Rally Board: Cutting the budget entirely.

- Model United Nations: Receiving an increase of \$600 onto a proposed \$25,000.

- ASUO administration: Increasing by \$21,000. Including the Forensics budget which was dropped as a separate item.

- Draft Information Center: Increasing to \$3,560.

- International Education Center: Upped by \$1,350 to \$5,630.

- SEARCH: Was rebudgeted at \$7,150.

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Amended HB 1880

Editor's Note: The following is a copy of the proposed amendments to House Bill 1880, the campus disruption bill.

House Bill 1880 would be amended to read: Relating to public property; providing penalties; and declaring an emergency. Be it enacted by the People of the State of Oregon:

Section 1. As used in this Act unless the context requires otherwise: (1) "Police" means the municipal police and the county sheriff of the political subdivision in which the public property is located, and the Department of State Police.

(2) "Public official" means the state officer or employee who is the administrative head of the board, commission, state agency or division or department thereof which has jurisdiction over any public property, or his designate.

(3) "Public property" means state lands, premises and buildings including but not limited to any building used in connection with the transaction of public business or any lands, premises or buildings owned or leased by the State of Oregon.

Section 2. After consultation with the public official, or his designate, and the police, the Governor may proclaim an emergency period if he finds that there exists on any public property a clear and present danger of injury to persons, damage to property or denial of or substantial interference with ingress or egress from public property. The proclamation shall describe the public property affected by the proclamation. He shall cause his proclamation to be publicized. When the Governor finds that the danger has ended, he shall proclaim the end of the emergency period.

Section 3. During the emergency period proclaimed by the Governor under section 2 of this Act, the public official shall order excluded from the public property described in the proclamation such persons who in the judgment of the public official are contributing to or aggravating the danger which the Governor has proclaimed to exist.

Section 4. After informing the person ordered removed or excluded from the public property of the proclamation and order, the police shall remove or exclude such person from such public property.

Section 5. Any person ordered removed or excluded from any public property under section 2 of this Act shall have immediate access to the circuit court for the county in which the property is located for review of the order of exclusion or removal. Such access shall be in the form of a writ or review and shall be given priority over all cases on the docket of the circuit court.

Section 6. Any person who, having been ordered excluded or removed from any public property, knowingly enters thereon or who remains on such property during an emergency period proclaimed by the Governor under section 2 of this Act and who refuses to leave such property upon request by the police shall, upon conviction, be punished by imprisonment in the county jail for not more than one year or by a fine of not more than \$500, or both.

Section 7. This Act being necessary for the immediate preservation of the public peace, health and safety, an emergency is declared to exist, and this Act shall take effect on its passage.

Wants responsive student government

Winger, candidate for the ASUO presidency, is a junior in history and has been involved in student government ever since he started as a freshman at the University.

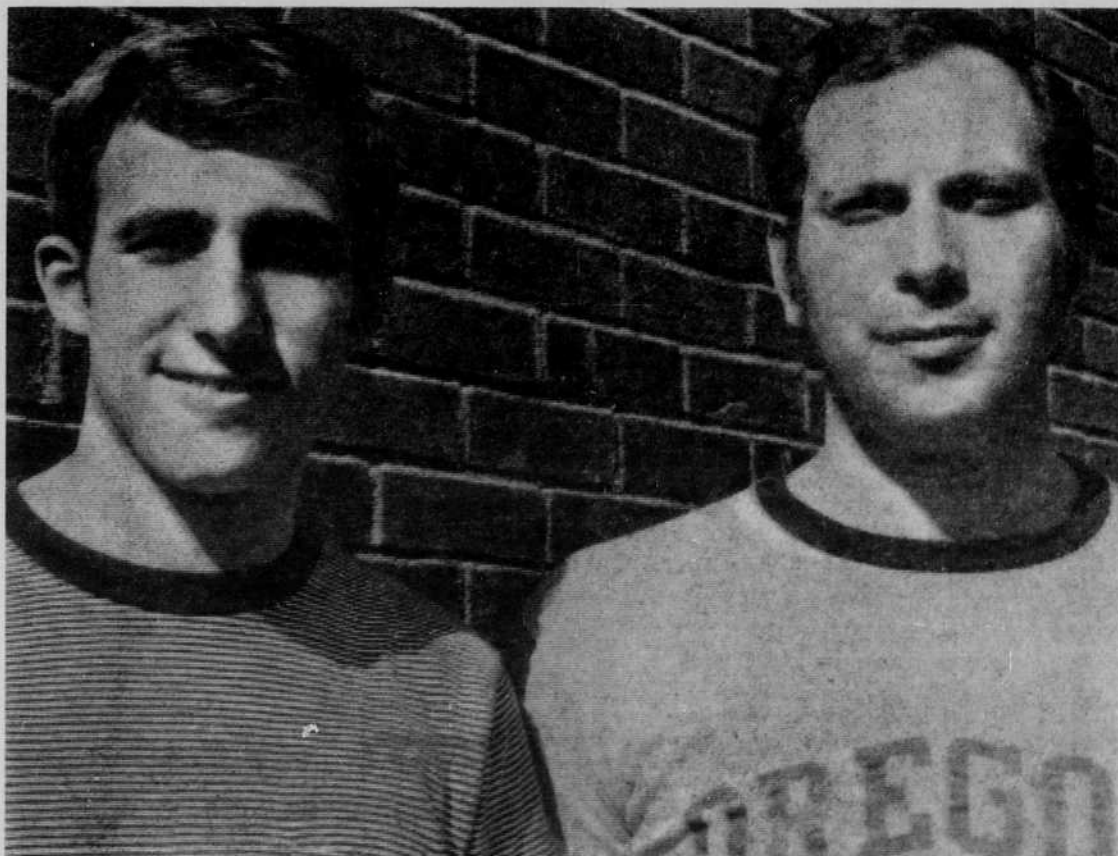
His running mate, Spence Alpert is a first year law student and "as an undergrad, I wasn't involved at all."

In an interview Sunday, the two candidates explained their programs, goals and reasons for running for office.

According to Winger, his interest in student government began very early. "My father has been a professor at OSU for 30 years. My whole environment has been one of education and it has given me an interest in education and a sense of citizenship."

"You can learn about yourself and learn how to handle people. I intend to go to law school and the things I have learned by being committed to goals and principals will help me."

Alpert said he became involved for the first time this year

because "I could see many changes that needed to be made in the education system and I could see that many people who were trying to make changes weren't going about it in the best possible way."

"I felt that I could try to improve University relations between the University and the community."

Both candidates feel it is important to get more students involved in student government. To do this, they propose to have an activity interest card in the registration packet. On this, students could indicate interest in various programs and areas.

Thus, when a committee is formed to work on a project, leaders could get names of people who have expressed an interest and make personal contact with those people.

In addition, Winger and Alpert explained, the student body officers "should show a personal interest after people get involved and try to effectuate the programs they are working on so they get some rewards."

Winger said, "You mobilize people by not staying on the third floor of the EMU. You can't stay even a little bit aloof."
