RCU discusses formation of liberation organization

Plans for the formation of a Liberation Support Group (LSG) were discussed Monday afternoon at the term's first meeting of the Radical Collectives Union (RCU).

According to an RCU member, LSG will be a broad-based University and community group involving all individuals and organizations interested in supporting the organization's three major goals.

These goals will be:

- To distribute literature on campus and in the community on liberation struggles in the U.S. and foreign countries.

- To raise money for liberation struggles inside the U.S.

- And to create mass support for legal struggles in this Eugene area.

According to the RCU member, the purpose of the LSG will be "to unite people who are anti-imperialist in one mass group centered around a minimal program."

This program, he explained, can include support for an Anti-Imperialism Symposium scheduled to be held on campus early in February, support work for Angela Davis, support for the nation-wide lettuce boycott sponsored by the United Farm Workers, and support work for several Iranian students facing trial in Iran for anti-government activities.

Involvement in the LSG, the RCU member continued, may come from student groups, progressive faculty members,

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asking if I'm willing to back off from this faculty responsibility, I'd say 'no,' he said.

While also holding that faculty should "have some say in setting standards," Clyde Patton, geography professor, said he thought Eachus should still retain his position.

Terming the matter a "silly issue," he said "since there's obviously been some misunderstanding about it, I don't think Ron should be held for rules he

didn't know he was playing under."

A few professors were in favor of letting the ASUO make its own rules for student officers.

"I think there are clearly some matters that are student responsibility and I clearly define this as that," said political science professor Joe Allman.

Waldo McNeir, English professor, said he didn't think the faculty should set requirements for student government positions.

Several professors said they had heard talk that motions concerning the matter might be presented at the January general faculty meeting Wednesday.

However, chances are slim that any motion could be considered at that meeting.

Faculty legislation requires that a 30-day notice be given for any motions involving a major change in policy.

A few of the professors contacted said they would be willing to suspend rules to consider a motion of the Eachus issue. However, according to Robert's Rules of Order, rules requiring notice of motion cannot be suspended since they are intended to protect those absent from the meeting, who were not aware the matter would be discussed.

"All of you know the ship of state sails on only when we brave storm after storm with a combination of patience, humor, imagination, determination—and teamwork."

McCall outlined three basic tasks for the Legislature which he thought "demand its earliest attention."

First, was a "reconstitution" of Oregon's welfare program.

Second, was the "initiation this year of a substantial federal revenue-sharing operation with state and local governments."

And third, was a new program, federally and locally, which would call for "extended unemployment benefits" during periods when there is a high unemployment rate.

McCall also delivered a general message to the legislators dealing with basic attitudes.

"Compromise indeed is bad for the spirit if it limits one's ideals or goals."

"At the same time, if we renounce realism and gradualism, we may—paradoxically—be frustrated in our ideals and see the realization of our goals delayed."

McCall spent nearly one-third of speech addressing the general subject of environment and natural resources.

some community groups, minority groups, women's organizations and dorm groups.

Other issues with which the LSG may involve itself are getting ROTC off campus, support for political prisoners locally and nationally, and the question of corporate and military recruiting at the University.

"The importance of this type of work is that it keeps us from being isolated from the rest of the campus and community," another RCU member said.

He said that LSG will be working through established University and community channels.

LSG will have its first meeting for all interested persons at 2:30 p.m. Friday in the EMU.

RCU members also discussed plans for a dance which will be held this Friday at 8:30 p.m. in an effort to raise bail money for persons arrested last year during political activities on campus.

Individual members also announced that the Fighting Red Duck, a campus newspaper supported by RCU, will no longer be published, and that a bi-weekly bulletin will be distributed on campus giving a history of and presenting developments related to Black Panther trials in New Haven and New York City.

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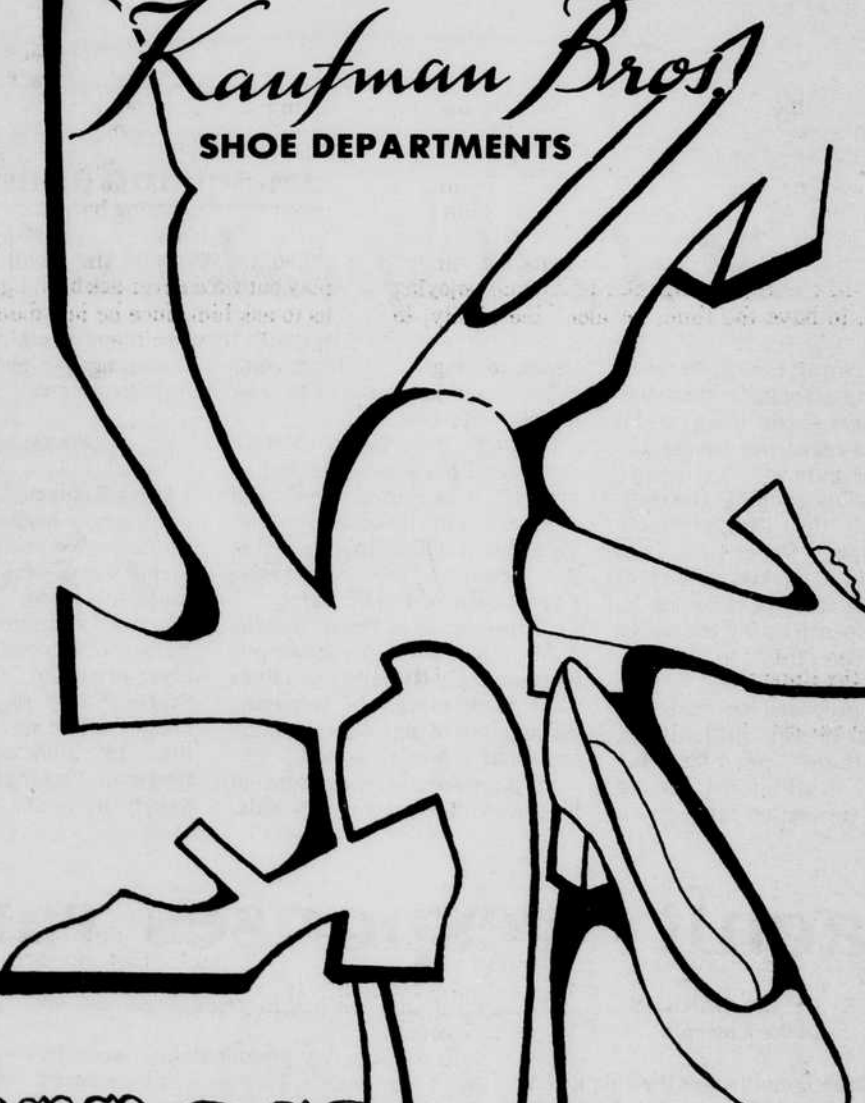
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
