Tax expert visits university

Federal taxation authority Gersham Goldstein of the University of Cincinnati College of Law is a visiting professor of law at the University during winter and spring terms this year.

Goldstein is teaching classes in federal taxation, state and local taxation, and tax policy, according to Law School Dean Eugene Scoles.

Past chairman of the Association of American Law Schools' Tax Roundtable Council, the visiting professor is one of the authors of Barton's "Federal Tax Laws Correlated" and an author of the federal income tax sections of the 1965 and 1966 "Annual Survey of American Law."

Goldstein served as law clerk to Judge Peter Gunnar of the Oregon Tax Court in 1963-64, before joining the University of Cincinnati faculty. He was a visiting associate professor of law at the New York University Law School in the summer of 1969.

Artists compete for \$1,000

Professional artists are being invited to compete for four \$1,000 prizes to be awarded to winners of the 2nd Annual Statewide Services Competition.

The competition, formerly known as the Pre-Pak Awards Competition, is being sponsored by the Statewide Services of the University Museum of Art.

Each artist will submit one finished work as an entry, plus information on a future one-man show to be circulated by Statewide Services in its traveling exhibitions throughout the state in the next two years.

Entries may be submitted at any of three locations—the Rogue Gallery in Medford, no later than March 3, the University Museum of Art in Eugene on March 4, or at Meier & Frank's downtown store on March 5.

Judging will take place on March 8. Judges for the event are Louis Bunce, of the Portland Art Museum, John Masterson, faculty member at Mt. Angel College, and Betty LaDuke, on the faculty of Southern Oregon College.

Daniel Berrigan topic of film showing tonight

A film, "Dan Berrigan, the Holy Outlaw" will be shown tonight at 8 p.m. in 180 PLC. Admission will be 50c, the proceeds going to support the coalition of Native Tribes for Red Power, in Madison, Wis.

Berrigan, along with his brother Philip and twelve others, were named last week by a federal grand jury as co-conspirators in an alleged plot to kidnap presidential advisor Henry Kissinger and blow up heating systems in federal buildings.

Daniel, a Jesuit priest, and his brother Philip, a Roman Catholic priest, are both serving federal prison sentences for destruction of Selective Service records at Catonsville, Md., in 1968.

FBI Chief J. Edgar Hoover earlier named the brothers as part of the East Coast Conspiracy to Save Lives, which had allegedly planned the kidnapping and bombings to demand U.S. withdrawal from Vietnam and the release of political prisoners in this country.

In the indictment, Philip Berrigan, two other priests, a former priest and nun were named as conspirators, with Daniel, three nuns, a priest and a former priest named as co-conspirators.

After their conviction for destroying draft records, both Berrigan brothers eluded the FBI for several months by "going underground." Included in the film today will be sequences filmed while Daniel was still in hiding.

The film is being sponsored by the campus YWCA.

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Counseling center offers career study, guidance

University counseling center has started a career counseling program for freshmen and sophomores. The intent of the program, according to Art Snyder, of the counseling center, is to give the participant an opportunity to "get a picture of himself and a picture of himself in a career."

Snyder said the program was started in hopes that it can "alleviate the problem of the senior who comes to us and asks 'What can I do with this degree?'"

The program will consist of five sessions attended by six students and two members of the counseling staff. Snyder added that a "group interaction helping others" is intended. However, he said the "focus is on treating the individual and his problems with

choosing a career."

Snyder said the groups will center on discovering "interests, values, and abilities of the individual. We will attempt to present them with a picture of themselves and show them how this picture would fit into a given profession."

"The program will be an ongoing process," said Snyder. "We will continue this into the following terms with any improvements which become obviously necessary."

The program requires the normal \$7.50 testing fee which will give the counselors an idea of the abilities of the participant. Snyder said the groups will meet on Monday afternoons and on Wednesday evenings. He hoped that additional times could be arranged.

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
