Buhlinger released on bail

University student Wayne Buhlinger, who was arrested in his dormitory room last week for allegedly selling marijuana, was released from the City-County Jail on \$500 bail Friday.

Buhlinger was arrested in his Young Hall room and charged with illegal sale of narcotics after allegedly selling marijuana to a police undercover agent.

Buhlinger's arrest was made by members of the Lane Interagency Narcotics Team (LINT), who work under the direction of Lane County District Attorney John Leahy. Leahy had been out of town and unavailable for comment, so details of Buhlinger's arrest were not made clear until Friday.

The district attorney told the Emerald Friday that Buhlinger was arrested after selling one lid of marijuana to a police officer accompanied by an informant.

Leahy said the arrest was made in Buhlinger's dorm room at about 11:45 p.m. The Eugene Register-Guard had reported Buhlinger was arrested at 11:45 a.m.

Leahy said that marijuana had been confiscated from Buhlinger's car after the sale but before the arrest. This marijuana, he said, included some loose marijuana in the car, as well as a paper sack containing 11 lids.

Leahy said that no University officials were notified prior to the arrest, adding that he didn't think such notification to be necessary.

"There is no legal requirement that we notify anybody. To my knowledge, generally speaking, we haven't (notified University officials)," Leahy said.

A different view of the question had been aired by Gerald Bogen, special assistant to University President Robert Clark, last week.

Bogen said he didn't want to suggest that the University should be a sanctuary from the laws established by the community, but he did express some concern about the arrest being made without the knowledge of the University administration.

"I think it's an acknowledged fact of history that large numbers of police officers on university campuses, especially at unusual hours, can be ineffectual. We who are in charge of administering campuses should have the opportunity to, at the very least, advise on the appropriateness of particular police actions on campus," the presidential assistant said last week.

Clark says ruling on Eachus' status may not be final

The Student Administrative Board (SAB) ruling that Ron Eachus may remain ASUO President may not be final, according to University President Robert Clark.

Clark, in a statement released after last week's SAB meeting, points out that "I still have before the faculty of the University the question whether I have taken the right course in advising Mr. Eachus to petition for exception and my invitation that they advise me. The faculty may choose to advise me or not. Until the faculty has had time to express its opinion, I am not prepared to say whether or not the SAB ruling is final."

Clark has also moved to clarify the controversy about Eachus' status for persons outside the University community. In a letter addressed to "friends of the University," which was dated last Friday, he said, "I believe that officers of student government should be bona fide students in good standing and that they should make substantial progress towards their degrees during their term of office."

Clark's letter went on to explain how a clerical error in publishing the University's Administrative Manual had "further confused the issue of the present ASUO President's eligibility."

But, the President wrote, "the present ambiguities will be eliminated when the new student handbook is issued."

Small fire damages Johnson Hall

An estimated \$200 damage was done to equipment in the Johnson Hall furnace room by a Saturday evening fire.

The fire apparently originated in an overheated motor, according to the Eugene Fire Department.

The fire in the basement of the University Administration Building was discovered at 7:40 p.m. Saturday.

Chicanos hear Toelken sing, speak on folklore

Although the lettuce boycott issue has been a top concern of the Chicano Student Union, several members of the CSU relaxed at a special meeting last Thursday night where guest speaker, Assoc. Prof. Barry Toelken gave an informal program on folklore.

Toelken, an English professor at the University, spoke on traditions and values that make up a folklore, ranging from hand gestures to jokes. He remarked that white society "dampens" folklore since it puts basic emphasis on individuality rather than group relationship."

Appearing as though he could have just finished a hike down Spencer's Butte, Toelken, accompanied by his guitar, sang several Navajo and Chicano folksongs. Also sung was "Midnight Special," a prison song and also a fogging song.

Through his travels, Prof. Toelken has studied several customs and has gathered a collection of folksongs that represent the attitudes of many people.

Ghost stories and jokes were exchanged towards the end of the CSU meeting. Referring to common taboo subjects such as sex and racism that many of our jokes are aimed at, Toelken concluded that "the jokes of a culture help us to whistle in the dark."
