

Photo main objection to identification cards

The main objection to the new student identification cards to be used fall term is the presence of the student's photograph, according to several interviews conducted in the Erb Memorial Union Wednesday.

"They're an indication of the security system," said Fred Atkinson, University student. "They're trying to keep a closer eye on individuals."

"It sounds like more of a gestapo type thing," according to Denise Quebedeau. "If I sound paranoid it's because we have enough stuff like that surrounding us that we have a right."

"There have been cases where confidential information was used where it shouldn't have been used and it bothers people. . . . These cards may not be anything like that . . . but we have a right to wonder."

"It's a good way for the F.B.I. to get everyone's picture," said Tom Wolfe, major in liberal arts. "They were sufficient the way they were. It's definitely a way of keeping track of students and their records . . . a convenient way for the administration to get everyone's picture."

"It's not a good idea, I don't think they should have a picture on them. This goes for four years?" Jan Chaloupka, majoring in business administration continued, "You've signed your life away for four years."

Some students were not so disturbed.

"They're the kind we had in Illinois," explained Shari Madden.

"It doesn't make much difference," said a major in architecture, John Sonderren.

"They're more expensive to make, the others were just as good. All you need is your number and your name. They were used in my community college and I don't see any advantages."

"It doesn't make a great deal of difference. The new one is more detailed so less likely to be infringed upon," Zac Roberts explained. "I don't think that's good, necessarily. The students have no way to get back (at the university for misuse of funds, etc.) because they can't cheat with them."

In general, students were in favor of the use of a social security number rather than the student body number.

"You don't have so many

numbers to remember," explained Jan Chaloupka.

"It's great, I already memorized that one," laughed Shari Madden.

"It doesn't bother me," said Rozann Shipley, a physical education major. "One number is the same as another one."

However, according to Rusty Cohen, who is not a student at the university, "I wouldn't put a social security number on anything. It's against the law." (For identification purposes) "I just don't like numbers, they're dehumanizing."

And some students objected to the expense.

According to Donna Lemmer, major in elementary education, "The cost of making them is prohibitive, and if you lose it, it costs four dollars for a new one." "I don't think it's necessary," said Greg Rovon. "There's not enough money to go around for a lot of projects, they shouldn't be considering new ways to spend it."

Faculty, grads opposing war to meet tonight

Graduate students and faculty members interested in helping end the Indochinese war will meet tonight at 8 p.m. in the EMU.

The meeting, which is being sponsored by members of the University Chapter of the New University Conference (NUC), is to discuss the People's Peace Treaty and how to implement it at the University among faculty members and graduate students.

Albert Szymanski, assistant professor of Sociology and NUC member, said "This meeting is especially crucial at this time, right after a critical defeat of Nixon's war policy. Every effort must be made at this point to exert maximum pressure on the U.S. government to end the war quickly by the measures outlined in the People's Peace Treaty. This meeting will attempt to tie the faculty and graduate students into the campaign to implement the treaty which is growing nationwide and will reach its peak during the first weeks of May."

The New University Conference is a national organization of faculty, graduate students and staff.
