More higher education bills going through committees

Editor's note: The following is a continuation of the list of bills relating to Universities and Colleges and their position in the State Legislature in Salem as of March 29.

State and Federal Affairs.

HB 1790—Prohibits state financial aid to students enrolled in a branch of a college with out-of-state headquarters, unless approved by the Educational Coordinating Council. Read twice and referred to Health, Education and Welfare.

HB 1917—Authorizes circuit court, on behalf of the State Board of Higher Education in an equity suit, to issue injunctions and restraining orders to prevent disruption, obstruction, or harassment of normal activities at any state institution of higher education. Read twice and referred to Judiciary.

HB 2037—Appropriates \$169,600,000 to the Department of Higher Education for biennial expenses. Limits biennial expenditures from revenues other than the appropriation to \$19,939,184 and declares and emergency. Read twice and

referred to Ways and Means.

HB 2038—Appropriates \$3 million to the Board of Higher Education for land acquisition and capital construction. Establishes maximum limits for designated higher education expenditures and declares and emergency. Read twice and

House Joint Memorial 1—Requests the U.S. Government to delay disposition of Adair Air Force Base to United States International University. Requests time for the Oregon Legislature to explore possible utilization of the land by resident groups within the state. Read twice with two hearings and referred to State and Federal Affairs.

HB 1587—Increases State Board of Higher Education to 17 members. Read twice and referred to Health, Education and Welfare.

HB 1594—Restricts the use of funds collected by the State Board of Higher Education from student housing to operational and construction uses. Read twice and referred to Health, Education and Welfare.

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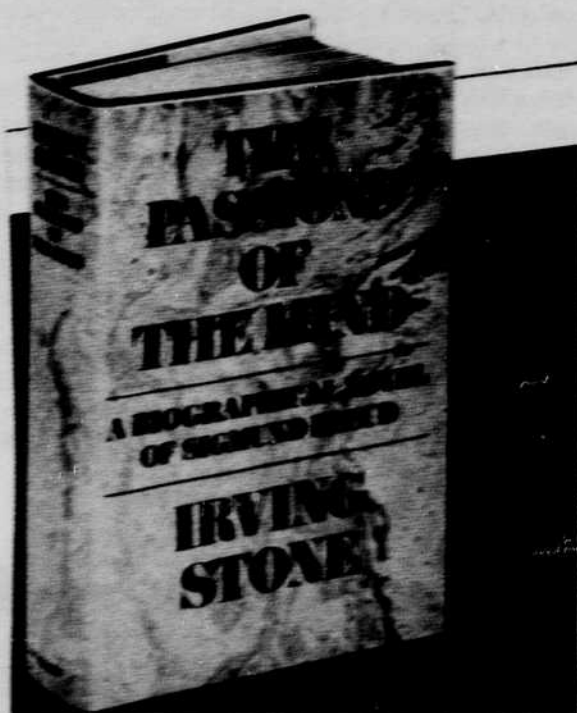
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
