

New guidelines may govern incidental fee hearings

The ASUO Fiscal Committee begins spicing up a \$1 million-plus loaf of bread known as the Student Incidental Fees Budget Friday.

Incidental fees fund the athletic department, the Erb Memorial Union and ASUO sponsored activities, and generally no organization ever gets what it wants.

This year, the budget considerations may be guided by a set of procedures passed by an ad hoc student-faculty committee last Tuesday. The ASUO Senate

is expected to take action on these guidelines next Thursday.

The committee, which includes ASUO President Ron Eachus, EMU director Dick Reynolds, and Senate President Iain More, was formed after the State Board of Higher Education decided to allow individual institutions to establish their own incidental fees. Beginning fall term 1971, the University will have the power to set a fee between \$15 and \$25 a term.

The State Board currently requires a fee of \$28 at each institution.

Major recommendations of the ad hoc Incidental Fee Committee include:

Programs and activities considered for support shall be divided into "major budget activities" and minor budget activities.

The ASUO and University shall assist in obtaining alternate sources of funding if it is deemed necessary to make substantial decreases in support for activities.

Incidental fees may be changed by the ASUO Senate.

Emerald under new management

The Oregon Daily Emerald will be under new management as of this afternoon.

The Constitution of the Oregon Daily Emerald Board of Directors will be signed today by University President Robert Clark, ASUO President Ron Eachus and Emerald editor Grattan Kerans, thus vesting in a new nine member board complete control over the financial structure of the University's student newspaper.

The new board, which succeeds the old Student Publications Board, is expected to move shortly on the incorporation of the Emerald as an independent organization, legally and financially separate from the University and the Oregon State Board of Higher Education. July 1, 1971, has been set as the target date for incorporation.

The Oregon Daily Emerald is published Monday through Friday during school year, except during exam and vacation periods. Twice weekly during 8-week summer session; once weekly during 3-week summer session, by the Publications Board of the University of Oregon.

After reviews by the ASUO Fiscal Committee and ASUO Senate, the budget shall be presented to the University President.

The division of the budget into two categories, major and minor, is an addition to the present budget organization. Those programs considered major activities are the Athletic Department and Erb Memorial Union. All other programs are classified as minor activities. Within the latter category are programs which have been traditionally funded.

The criteria assisting programs whose proposal was decreased is also new. It applied to either major budget activities or traditionally funded activities.

Specifically, an decrease in major activities shall not exceed 10 per cent of the preceding year's allocation. This limitation may be exceeded if the proposed change is submitted to the student body by referendum and is approved by a majority of students voting.

Appeals are provided for in the new procedures. If an appeal has been tried before the fiscal committee and Senate, then members of the appealing agency may meet with representatives of the President's office.

After the budget is sent to the University president, it is submitted before the State Board of Higher Education.

Most discussion on Tuesday's meeting centered on when or if students should be allowed to vote on increasing the incidental fee level. One committee member proposed if the increase were more than \$2, it should be put before the student body for a vote. For example, if the fee level were set at \$17 and the fiscal committee asked it to be increased to \$20, a vote would be taken. No decision was made on this proposal.

The guidelines, with additional comments by committee members will go before the ASUO Senate for approval April 15.

The only comments on the motion came from sponsor Harry Alpert, Dean of Faculties, who said simply that the proposal "turned out to be very timely."

He was referring to recent charges by the U.S. Department of Health, Education and Welfare that the University is discriminating against women in employment.

The committee, to include faculty, student and classified service employees, will advise the University president and other personnel officers on employment practices.

Faculty also approved a motion to set up a committee on the status of faculty women. Sponsor Grace Graham, education professor, said the group wasn't intended to be "highly militant," but rather an "educational committee."

It's job would be to encourage faculty women to take a greater part in University governance and try to identify barriers to career development for both women and students and faculty.

"We feel the villain—if there is one—is the process of socialization," she said. "Both men and women are guilty and we feel it's high time we do something about it."
