

What to do abroad

IEC Travel Faire opens today

Bright colored posters and flags of foreign nations will decorate the EMU Ballroom today as the International Travel Faire, opens, for the first time on the University Campus from 8 a.m. until 4 p.m.

The event, sponsored by the International Education Center (IEC), is aimed at students who have dreamed about travelling but never looked into it because of the money factor, according to Bill Fidler, publicity chairman for the Travel Faire.

"Many people think you have

to have a lot of money to travel when in reality you don't," he emphasized.

Travel films and folk dance demonstrations are among the festivities planned for the free public faire.

Tables offering information on travel and study abroad will be manned by local travel agencies, international airlines, automobile and motorcycle companies as well as representatives from organizations such as the Peace Corps.

Students will be able to purchase identification cards at the Faire which will entitle them to

reduced fees on tours and certain types of transportation through Europe and in some cases free admission into museums and other points of interest.

Also available for purchase at the Faire will be passport pictures. Pictures will be taken by appointment, and may be purchased for a reduced rate of three pictures for \$2, or five pictures for \$5.50.

The University dance school is scheduled to demonstrate folk dances from various countries at 11:30 a.m., 1:30 p.m. and possibly 3:30 p.m. in the Ballroom.

Travel films, which will be shown during the day in the Dad's

room, will be announced in the EMU every hour and every half hour during lunch time.

Fidler emphasized the Faire is being sponsored to give free information to students interested in travelling abroad. It is by no means trying to sell anything, although it does offer the opportunity for students to buy identification and youth hostile cards.

Fidler, a junior in sociology from Eugene is one of the 25-30 volunteers working in IEC.

The primary purpose of the IEC is to fulfill the needs of the University community for an integrated source of information and promotion for programs involving international education, employment and travel.

The idea behind the center is that the opportunity to learn and grow through intercultural experience contributes to the University's ultimate goal of providing each student a truly liberal education.

State Guard bill heard before house committee

Salem (Special) A bill which would cut the size of the Oregon National Guard to 1500 men received a hearing before a house committee Tuesday afternoon.

There are presently 7500 men in the guard and the state spends about 3.3 million to support it. The state's share is only 10 per cent of the Guard's entire budget, with the rest of the funds coming from the federal government.

The bill, which was before a sub-committee of the Committee on State and Federal Affairs, sets a target date of July 1, 1975 for the reduction.

Rep. Allen Pynn, R-Clackamas County and a co-sponsor of the bill, told the committee that, "I have been told by more than one member of the Guard that it is a wasteful experience and expenditure of one's time." Pynn also described the Guard as a "joke" and as a "country club" for some members.

Pynn said that the Guard could possibly be useful during times of civil disturbances and civil emergencies, "but the men are not trained in these areas." Pynn said that the state could use the money that is presently allocated to the Guard for other more important programs and that the State Police could be beefed up to take its place.

Rep. Marvin Hollingsworth, D-Multnomah county and a co-sponsor of the bill, said that he would offer amendments to the bill that would abolish the guard by Jan. 1, 1972.

In other business:

• A bill which would virtually prohibit mass gatherings in the state was recommended for

approval Monday by the Senate State and Federal Affairs Committee.

• The creation of an interim committee to study alternate methods of financing higher education tuition costs received support before a house sub-committee.
