SEATTLE, Wash. (Special)—It would be hard to give sufficient praise to all the heroes . . . Greg Brosterhous, Steve Greenough, Dave Roberts, Mike Bubalo, Bruce Maxwell, Andy Jones.

They all played a major role over the weekend as the Oregon baseball team swept a three-game Pacific-8 series from the Washington universities, and emerged with a 4-2 league record and undisputed possession of second place in the Northern Division.

Brosterhous drilled a three-run, ninth-inning homer Friday to give the Ducks an 8-6 win over Washington State in Pullman. Then the Webfoots swept Washington here Saturday, Greenough firing a four-hit shutout for the 3-0 first game victory before his teammates claimed a 10-5 nightcap decision.

Roberts, Bubalo and Maxwell were Oregon's big sticks on the road. Roberts was 5-for-10 with four RBIs, and Maxwell also had four "ribbies" on two doubles and a pinch-hit homer against WSU. Bubalo burst from a season long slump with a 6-for-13 performance, including five safeties in the Saturday doubleheader.

Jones pitched two strong innings of relief to earn the victory over Washington State's Cougars. And the junior from Jacksonville will be on the mound

JVs take two games

Judging from the Oregon JVs 2-1 loss to the Linfield JVs on Saturday it appears that the Ducklings are about to embark upon another losing string.

The JVs' season so far has been one of cycles. For the first eight games Oregon scored only 22 runs and won only one of those encounters. But over the next five contests the Ducklings tallied 42 times and won all five games.

In Saturday's loss, Oregon managed to get only three hits off winning Linfield pitcher Randy Fink. The Wildcats scored the winning run in the sixth inning when John Hanna, who had gotten one base via a walk, scored on a Don Bronson wild pitch.

Friday, when they were still hitting, the JVs rapped 24 hits in dropping Southwestern Oregon Community College 9-7 and 11-2.

Leading the five game hitting binge was Dixon Ingalls who went 12 for 23 and is currently pacing the team with a .419 batting average. Also over the .300 mark are Rob Barnes, .385; Walt Reynolds, .364 and Brian Flug, .333.

The JVs will try to reach the .500 mark today when they again play the Linfield JVs, this time at McMinnville. Tomorrow the Ducklings meet Oregon College of Education at Monmouth.

again today when the Ducks take on Portland State in a 3 p.m. non-league contest at Howe Field.

WSU led the Ducks 4-0 after six innings of their game in Pullman.

But pinch-hitter Bob Claydon led off the Oregon seventh with a sharp single, and Earle Wicklund followed with another base hit. Both runners advanced on an error, then Gary Nall's sacrifice fly and a single by Roberts produced Oregon's first two runs. Roberts scored on a Guy Krause single.

The Cougars increased their edge to 5-3, but Brosterhous led off the Duck eighth with a single, and Maxwell followed with his pinch-hit homer to knot the contest.

WSU tallied an unearned run in its half of the eighth, though, and Oregon had to scrap again in the ninth.

Bubalo singled as the leadoff batter, and Krause walked. Don Knapp forced pinch-runner Tom Maletis at third, and the Ducks were two outs from defeat. But Brosterhous, a junior third baseman, clouted the first home run of his varsity career over the center field fence to carry Oregon to victory.

Greenough pitched his finest game of the year in leading the Ducks to their whitewash of Washington in the doubleheader opener at Seattle.

The sophomore lefthander, who entered the contest with a bulging 7.36 earned run average, allowed only two balls to be hit out of the infield in seven innings. He also walked just two while striking out six in exhibiting fine control.

Washington hurler Bob Nelson pitched well, too, but the Webfoots finally got to him in the fifth. Wicklund walked to open the inning, moved to second as Nall grounded out, and scored on a single by Roberts.

Then Roberts took second when the leftfielder bobbled his hit, and came all the way in as Bubalo hit into a fielder's choice.

Bubalo also batted in Oregon's final run in the seventh. His single followed a walk to Roberts and a two-base UW error.

The Ducks pounded out 11 hits in the nightcap, but nine Husky errors—including six by shortstop Bob Ernst—actually contributed more to the Oregon cause. Only two of the visitors' 10 runs were earned.

Washington scored one run in each of the first two innings, but a single by Roberts and ensuing error helped Oregon tie the contest in the third. Then the Ducks went ahead to stay in the fourth when Krause singled and Maxwell followed with a double.

Oregon tallied in the fifth on Duke Lawrence's double, and again in the sixth on a wild pitch to hold a 5-3 edge. The Ducks wrapped the game up with five runs in the eighth.

Starting and winning pitcher Alan Hardin led off with a single, and Wicklund followed with another hit. The Huskies spaced four errors around two outs, and Maxwell capped the frame with his second double.

Duck trackmen downed; Hearvey stars in 100

The University of Oregon track team met defeat Saturday afternoon in Los Angeles as the UCLA Bruins took advantage of their well balanced strengths in downing the Ducks 86-59.

There were relatively few surprises or upsets in the meet, and the Bruin victory and final score followed form chart predictions. The significance of this meet, and all dual meet competition, does not lie in the final score; rather, the important element of these Saturday afternoon events is found in the individual performances.

Dual track meets have dual functions, the lesser being to 'win.' Their real purpose is to prepare trackmen for competition in the big meets, i.e., the Pacific-8 Championships and the NCAA's.

Both the Ducks and the Bruins received top performances by a dozen or more athletes. There were five events where particularly good competition was seen, and the two relays saw both teams run season bests.

Oregon's standout performer was Albert Hearvey. Running with an injured leg, Hearvey won the 100 yard dash in 9.4 seconds, by outprinting UCLA's Warren Edmonson and Reggie Robinson in the last 30 yards. Hearvey almost caught John Smith of the Bruins in the 220, but finished second in a season best of 20.8, to Smith's 20.6.

Steve Prefontaine led a Duck sweep in the mile by dipping under the four minute mark in a fine time of 3:59.1. Equally encouraging were Rick Ritchie's and Todd Lathers times of 4:02.8 and 4:05.0, respectively.

The Bruins went 1-2 in the 440 yard dash as Smith ran a season best of 46.0 and teammate Wayne Collett finished second in 46.1. Weldon Vance of the Ducks finished third in 47.4.

One of the closest races of the afternoon was run in the 880. Nils Emilsson of Oregon narrowly missed overcoming UCLA's Paul Williams at the tape as both runners were timed in 1:51.1.

Other Ducks to compete well were Marty Hill, taking first in high jump (6-10); Pete Shmock's second place finish in the shot put (60-1¼); Paul Wilkinson's 53.9 intermediate hurdles time and

Bouncy Moore, with four jumps over 25 feet, taking second at 25-8¾ in the long jump.

Next Saturday the Ducks travel to Pullman, Wash. for another dual meet, this time against the Cougars of Washington State. The following week, Oregon goes to Corvallis for the Oregon State meet. The Ducks then finish their Pacific-8 season with the Northern Division in Pullman and then the Pacific-8 meet in Seattle.
