Repertory company to stage three plays

A direct outgrowth of last year's Shakespeare repertory experiment, the University Theatre Repertory Company is now being formed for the purpose of producing three rotating dramatic productions in the spring.

Membership in the Company is to represent as wide a cross-section of the University community as possible, and is by audition only. Auditions will be held from 7:30 - 11 p.m. tonight in the Arena Theatre of Villard Hall. Rehearsals will begin in January and weekly meetings will be held throughout the fall.

The plays, to be produced in repertory, are "Ah, Wilderness!" by Eugene O'Neil, "The Taming of the Shrew" (in Commedia adaptation) by William Shakespeare, and "A Ceremony Called Revelation," an original script to be built by the Company through the repertory experience and to be based on the Book of Revelations.
