Wayne Morse speech

Nixon policy criticized

"It is elementary constitutional law that Congress cannot delegate legislative powers to the President," said former Senator Wayne Morse Saturday night, "It can only delegate administrative and ministerial power to the President."

Morse, a candidate this year for the Senate, spoke to more than 75 persons at a public meeting sponsored by the Lane County AFL-CIO Council at the Eugene Hotel Saturday night.

The topic of his speech was "Unjust Economic Discriminations Against Labor, Business and Consumers." His major criticism was President Nixon's Economic Control System. "It is for Congress to pass legislation that sets forth substantive provisions of law that define, enumerate and mandate the specifics of the economic controls that are to be administered and ministerially carried out by the President in accordance with enforcement procedures as provided for by the Congress in legislation itself. This is not what Congress has done."

The former senator went on to say that allowing the President to exercise what he termed "arbitrary capricious discretionary power" will jeopardize the country's system of constitutional self-government by



law. "This is but another example that our country is moving rapidly down a political road toward a government of executive supremacy and secrecy," said Morse. He added that "the growing dangerous trend toward government by executive supremacy and secrecy has come to pervade many aspects of our nation's domestic affairs and for some time it has dominated our nation's foreign policy." He referred to the trend as "a cancerous growth steadily weakening our constitutional system."

The Economic Control System, according to Morse, is an example of "a long record of failure on the part of this and past Congresses to carry out the check and balance system of the Constitution. He feels that Congress has been neglecting its constitutional obligation by failing to apply the necessary checks on the Executive Branch when Presidents exceed their Constitutional prerogatives."

Later in the speech, Morse stated that he has always been in favor of economic controls in time of war. He added, however, "Unfortunately when Congress passed its so-called economic control bills which contained attempts to delegate legislative powers to the President, he (Nixon) signed the legislation into law. What he should have done was veto the legislation and send it back to Congress with veto messages requesting Congress to detail the substantive controls and the procedure for the administrative enforcement which

he, as President, was to carry out under such laws."

He continued, "Further, by failing to spell out in detail what aspects of the economy were to be brought under control and in what manner, it has given to the President a dangerous degree of dictatorial powers over much of our nation's economy."

The failure on the part of Congress to pass detailed economic control legislation is resulting, according to Morse, in discriminations against labor, business and consumers.

He then went on to observe that the wealthiest fifth of American families receive 41 per cent of the income, while the poorest fifth only 5.6 per cent. In individual families the figures are not in families the figures are worse: 50.9 per cent for the wealthiest fifth and 3.4 per cent for the poorest fifth. In addition, the unequal distribution of wealth, he noted that inflation has cut into wages. Workers were able to buy less with their money in 1971 than they were in 1968. He said "Inflation is a hidden tax, which has been used to cover the expenses of the war in Vietnam."

President Nixon's anti-inflation measures, according to Morse, are favoring major corporations and the individuals who own them, and allowing them to raise prices without being restrained by competition. He feels that control of the economy is being used in the interest of business and is by-passing the average citizen. "Taxpayer money has been used to sustain corporations such as Lockheed and Pennsylvania State Railroad. At the same time benefits to the unemployed are kept at a very low level."

He finished by saying, "Nixon's policies are explicitly designed to increase the profits of corporations while restricting the wages of the working people. The price for inflation, according to Morse, should not be paid by the working people who have paid for it in the past, but by major corporations."

"The blame cannot all be placed at Nixon's door," said Morse, "however, his political philosophy of discrimination in favor of those with the greatest ability to pay over those with the least ability to pay; his willingness to grasp more and more unchecked power unto the Presidency calls upon the voters of the nation to exercise the ballot box check against him in November."
