Chicago Conspiracy film to be shown

A film about the Chicago conspiracy trial will be shown at 7:30 tonight in 180 PLC, sponsored by the Student Bar Association.

The film, based entirely upon 450 color sketches made by artist Franklin McMahon during the 1968 convention and the conspiracy trial, is being brought to Eugene by the Lane County Chapter of the American Civil Liberties Union.

Narration is by McMahon, but included are the actual voices of the trial defendants, witnesses, and major figures in the political scene of 1968-70. The one-hour film is entitled "69 CR. 180" from the trial case number.

Tonight's showing will be the first in Oregon of the film, which premiered in New York last May. Admission is 50 cents.

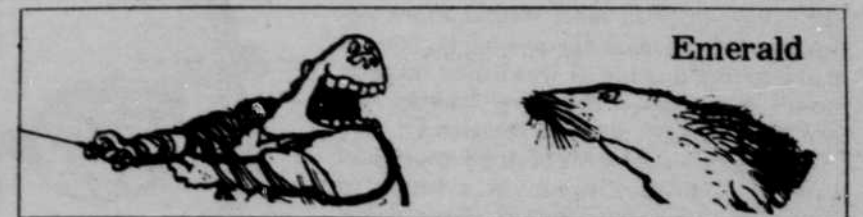
Incumbent Sheriff Harry Marlowe, also a Democrat, in December announced his intention to retire at the end of his current term.
