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Outdoor Program

establishes

wilderness college

Hundreds of University students are trekking through the winter wilderness, building snow caves and doing winter mountaineering this term as participants in a wilderness college that has been established by the ASUO Outdoor Program.

"People are learning that the outdoors in winter, generally considered a hostile environment, can be very enjoyable," says Gary Grimm, Outdoor Program director.

Called "Cascade College," the wilderness program claims to offer an experimental alternative to the present educational system.

Its members first get indoor instruction on the necessary equipment, food, and techniques for ski touring, winter mountaineering, snowshoeing, outdoor living, wilderness survival, snow and ice climbing, snow cave and igloo building, and on first aid, outdoor emergencies and rescue.

They then go on day-long and, by spring, more extended trips outdoors.

Grimm points out that the College is open to members of the community as well as to students, staff and faculty of the University.

"This is the kind of program," he says, "that allows a person to go from having hardly any information at all about winter outdoor pursuits to an extensive experience."

Quite a few people are involved who have never done anything in the outdoors before."

In the process, according to Grimm, those who take part learn leadership skills, how to organize groups, and how to teach others.

The basic premise of Cascade College is "to utilize the environment to accelerate the learning process, stimulate idea sharing and to provide opportunities to instruct and receive instruction in the many aspects of winter outdoor pursuits."

Each individual is asked to take full responsibility for every decision he or she makes.

Parent training sessions to start

A series of class sessions designed to help parents cope with problems before they occur start today under the direction of David Brinks, director of the Counseling Center at the University.

Entitled "Parent Effectiveness Training," it is a non-credit course with no prerequisites, no grades, and no examinations. The course is recommended for parents of any age children and both parents are encouraged to attend.

Sponsored by the Lane County Division of Oregon Personnel and Guidance, the class series will be held in the Westminster Presbyterian Church, 777 Coburg Road, for eight Monday nights from 7 to 9 p.m. A charge of \$35 per person will be made for the series. Registration for the course will be at the first class session.

Big Brothers being sought

Volunteers are now being sought to work with youngsters in the Bethel School District's Big Brother program.

"We're looking for volunteers who will spend 15 hours a month in order to build up a friendship with a young person who needs a good influence," says Bill Sharp, coordinator of the Bethel program.

Federal funds for Big Brother programs are aimed at children in low-income areas. Students are referred to the program by teachers and counselors.

Persons wishing to work with an elementary or junior-high age youngster may contact Sharp at Willamette High School.

Volunteers are expected to be high school juniors or older, and transportation is helpful though not necessary.
