Ruggers roll up 40 points in two wins

Coach Jim Lisle put his prediction that the Ducks would not lose to an American Team this year to a test over the weekend.

Oregon Ruggers warmed up Saturday against perennial powerhouse St. Mary's College who they beat, 24-3, thanks to the scoring of Ken Brown, who scored twelve. John Montagna, Terry Logan and Smokey Storm each contributed four. The green shirted visitors outplayed the St. Mary's team in all areas but the forwards but their defensive skills were what made the real difference.

Sunday they travelled to Davis where they played Cal Davis, a previously undefeated team who had already beat number one rated Stanford this season. When the smoke was over, Lisle's prediction was still looking good. The final tally showed Oregon with a 16-7 victory over Davis who were the first team to cross the Oregon goal line this season.

Once again the credit for victory was given to a strong defense which held a much heavier Stanford team down in the scoring department. Ken Brown's nine points added to four by John Montagna and three by Ross Douglas provided the points necessary for the win which gave the Ducks a 6-0 record so far for the season.

Meanwhile, on the Salem Fairgrounds, the seconds demolished Willamette's varsity, 12-4. Tony Evans, Glyn Bissix and R. Vic led the Green and Yellow victory on a water covered field in freezing temperatures.

volleyball

As coach Richard Cox put it, in one weekend Oregon's volleyball team "emerged from a crushing defeat in Eugene to become a title contender in Seattle."

The defeat had come at a YMCA competition late in the fall

quarter. The Seattle Invitational last weekend was the other event. That one included ten of the best teams in Northwest.

In the final standings the Lemon and Green tied with Vancouver, B.C. for third place. To get there they had pulled off the upset of the tournament by knocking out the Multnomah Athletic Club's team, an opponent they had not beaten in over three years. Their excellent blocking so upset the Portlanders that MAC lost their composure and fell to the Ducks, 15-1.

Oregon was knocked out of the contention for the title by Reubins 5, who are a Northwest powerhouse, by scores of 15-11 and 15-12. The Ducks feel that they will beat them in one of the future meetings between the two later this year.

Most outstanding of the players on the team were Gene Titsworth who displayed excellent hitting and superb court poise, and Ben Mahon who supplied a great deal of the blocking that ruined the MAC team.

Cox finished off by saying that "It is encouraging that we did so well when we have so much that we can improve on."

Thanks to strong comebacks in all three games the kegling team still has a good shot at the OCBT title this year. A poor start in the first games put the Ducks sixty pins behind in four frames and started the coach into a state of distraught.

But a double by Dave Nute seemed to pick the whole team up and when the final tally was made it was Oregon by thirty and it looked like a runaway...until the first six frames of the second games which found the green-shirts 110 sticks in the hole. Once again a comeback brought Oregon to within ten pins by the tenth and allowed them to take a

17 total pin lead into the third game. But again the Ducks fell behind, this time by twenty pins in the first frame, only to storm from behind late in the game and walk away with three of the four points.

Oregon now stands only two points behind in second place with Portland State unlikely to hold that lead after facing Oregon State Jan. 27. This will give the Ducks a good shot at successfully defending the title if they can take three out of four from the Beavers in February.

Against Portland State both the J.V.'s and the ladies took 3-1 victories. Ivan Isaacson led the varsity with a 587 series while Dave Higgins turned in a 583 for the JV's. Carol Racette turned in a surprising 551 for the girls.

Hilly Ebling paced a field of 30 "Class B" men at Ski Acres, Wash. Saturday as he fought the clock and freezing rain, wind and fog to turn in a 54.44 run. He was followed closely by Mike Hummel whose 58.36 garnered him third place in the Grand Slalom race.

On the soccer fields, Oregon teams each picked up a win over the weekend. The Mallards opened the show with a home victory over Portland Community College and the Cootbacks followed through with one on the road against the Forest Grove Keggers. Both scores were 8-1.

John Harries three goals paced the Mallards which also had help

from Alain Van Doosselaere, Scott Hand and Dick Jonker, not to mention a strong defensive line.

Coming off a two month injury Eric Thompson provided four goals, three in the first half, to put the Cootbacks in the lead to stay. Strong defense and good goalwork by Roger Heap kept the Keggers from ever drawing close, totally shutting them out in the first half.

Basketball stats

Ingram new scoring leader

After last week's New Mexico State tilt, the Ducks have a new team scoring leader. Billy Ingram leaped from third place to the top with a 23 point performance. The 6-4 forward upped his average from 12.7 to 13.6.

In second and third spots are Rusty Blair and Doug Little with 13.2 and 12.7 averages. Ken Strand, last week's leader, suffered his fourth consecutive game of scoring under double figures. Once hitting 17 points an outing, the guard is now down to a 12.4 clip.

The only other player averaging 10 or more points a contest is Al Carlson. The 6-11 center has netted 36 points in three game for a 12.0 average.

As a team, the shooting percentage improved

slightly; from .396 per cent to .401 per cent. Oregon opponents are hitting .468 per cent.
