Gandhian to speak today

Radhakrishna of New Delhi, India, secretary of the Gandhi Peace Foundation, will deliver a free public address today on "An Indian View of American Power in Asia."

The 12:15 p.m. speech in the EMU is sponsored by the School of Community Service and Public Affairs.

Radhakrishna is the former general secretary of Sarva Seva Sangh, the service organization of the Gandhian non-violent movement.

While in Eugene, Radhakrishna will speak also from 5:15 to 7:15 p.m., at the Newman Center, 1850 Emerald Street, on "The Relevance of Gandhi for Our Time" and at 8 p.m., also at the Newman Center, on "A Gandhian Looks at the Indo-Pakistani Conflict." The evening address is co-sponsored by the World Without War Council in Eugene.

All three sessions are free and open to the public.

Coleman to attend conference

Edwin L. Coleman, assistant professor of English at the University will attend the First National Congress of Black Professionals in Higher Education today through Friday in Austin, Texas. will be one of the nation's 250 professionals in higher education to assemble for the Congress on the campus of the University of Texas at Austin. The group will be predominantly Black, but will include others interested in exploring the problems of Blacks in higher education, and proposing realistic solutions to some of these problems.

Coleman, who teaches courses in Black literature at the University, has been in the University English department faculty since last fall.

Black Graduate Council to meet

The University's proposed Ethnic Studies program, the University's Affirmative Action program and the Tongue Point Job Corps Center in Astoria all are topics for a meeting of a recently formed group called the Black Graduate Student Council.

The meeting is scheduled for 3:30 p.m. this Sunday in the EMU. "All black graduate students from Africa, Latin America, the Caribbean and the United States are welcome," according to graduate teaching fellow Carol Cross in the department of biology.

"We would like to invite all Black undergraduates who are interested in working toward the development of a meaningful program to develop the potential of Black students here at the University," she said.

Ms. Cross said the purpose of the council, formed three months ago, is to "get some input into some of the decision-making at this University concerning Black graduate students." The council "is hoping to become a part of the Black Student Union," she said.

Sunday's meeting should be between two and three hours long, she added. Discussion will include "the development of a Black newsletter," she said.
