Ethnic Studies slates discussion

The Ethnic Studies Committee will meet with Burton Moyer, Dean of the College of Liberal Arts, today at noon in the EMU. The room will be posted.

The purpose of the meeting, according to James Klonoski, chairman of the committee, is to discuss the committee's recently completed Ethnic Studies Program proposal.

Moyer was appointed by University President Robert Clark to act as his agent in following the progress of the committee last fall.

At a previous meeting with the committee, Moyer and the college's two associate deans, Paul Holbo and Barry Siegel, expressed opposition to the idea of having a separate Ethnic Studies Program. They suggested, instead, retention of the committee to promote additional courses in different departments.

The new program proposal will be formally introduced at the April 12 faculty meeting as a notice of motion. It will then go to the Faculty Senate for their recommendation. The proposal will come before the general faculty, along with the Senate's recommendation, in May.

Before the proposal comes to a vote, Ethnic Studies Committee members hope to meet with members of the minority student unions and Gerald Bogen, vice president for student services, to find out what they think of the plan.

Klonoski said the committee has tentatively scheduled a meeting with minority students for next Tuesday and a meeting with Bogen April 18. Both meetings will be at noon in the EMU on the days scheduled.

'Role of Geology' to be address topic

Research geophysicist Dr. M. King Hubbert of the U.S. Geological Survey in Washington, D.C., will discuss "The Role of Geology in a Maturing Industrial Culture" in a free public address today at 3:30 p.m. in 221 Allen Hall at the University.

Dr. Hubbert has been one of the leading geological consultants for the U.S. government since before World War II, according to Dr. William Holser, chairman of the university Geology Department.

He will be in Eugene to deliver one of the main addresses at the Conference of Western Law Schools, which will take place Friday and Saturday at the university Law School. Theme of the conference is "Energy, Ecology and the Law."

Dr. Hubbert's afternoon address is an addition to his conference appearance.

Fine Arts Faculty to display collections

Four members of the Fine Arts faculty at the University are exhibiting prints and other objects from their private collections this week in Room 141 Lawrence Hall on campus.

The showing of "Things 'n Stuff" will continue through Saturday, and is open to the public weekdays from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. and on Saturday from 9 a.m. till noon.

A James McNeil Whistler etching, a Cassatt dry point and a number of Japanese prints from the 19th century are among the items representing collections of Paul Buckner, Tom Fawkes, Ken Paul and Bill Roy.

Also included in the show are several pieces of furniture, a woodcut illustrated book printed in 1632, "History of the English Peoples," pre-Columbian art, and a collection of cowboy comic books and bubble gum cards.
