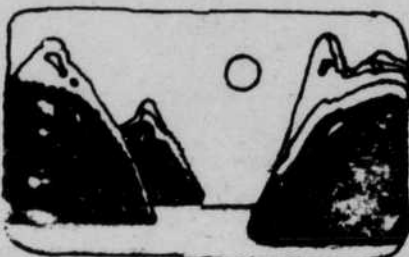

## Funds received for V.D. control

Lane County is about to receive at least \$19,000 in federal money for venereal disease control.

Speaking at the Lane County DemoForum Thursday noon, Rep. Nancie Fadeley announced that this money would greatly beef up the local v.d. control program.

The money will pay for a half-time nurse, a full-time licensed practical nurse and a half-time clerk-typist to work in the county v.d. clinic. The funds will also pay for a half-time laboratory technician to run screening tests to detect gonorrhea. These persons will work with V. D. Investigator Bill Leslie who was recently assigned to Lane County because of action of the 1971 legislature.

### Black Grad Council meets today

The Black Graduate Student Council will meet at 3:30 p.m. this Sunday in the EMU to discuss the University's affirmative action program, the proposed ethnic studies program, a Black newsletter for the campus and general goals for the group.

Council chairperson Carol Cross, teaching fellow in biology, said Thursday that the general goal of the council is "to enhance the stature of Black students on this campus."

She emphasized that poetry, stories, essays and articles written by Black students for and about Black persons are needed for the first edition of the Black newsletter. All contributions—writings or drawings—should be sent to her office, 204 Science I, biology department, she said.

### Slide show on Nepal slated

There will be a slide show at 3:30 p.m. and 8:30 p.m. Monday in the EMU, room to be posted, on Nepal. Jeff Kaley who lived in Nepal for 42 months will show slides and have tape recordings he took when he lived there. From the plains bordering N. India, into the jungles and foothills on up to the Himalayas is shown.

There are many geographical types of country within the Kingdom, and life styles subsistence levels vary. Jeff has taken many slides portraying these facets of life and environment and recorded many tapes ranging from classical ragas to Buddhist monks reciting mantras, village witch doctors, etc.

The show is being sponsored by International Education Center and the Outdoor Program. Admission is 50c.
