Three University students have been awarded scholarships for their work in the journalism and broadcast communications

areas. They are Jeanine Navarra and Steven Mueller and Janet Nelson.

Navarra, who will be a junior

at the University's School of Journalism next fall, was awarded the \$1,000 KPOK Broadcasting Scholarship. KPOK is a radio station in Portland. She plans to be a television or radio commentator.

Mueller, who won one of the Oregon Association of Broadcasters (OAB) scholarships for \$250, will be a sophomore and is majoring in broadcast journalism. He wants to pursue news in radio and television.

Nelson, who will be a senior, is a major in broadcast communications and special education, and plans to use broadcast communications as an educational device.

Qualifications for the scholarships are based on the students' interest in the communications field, their grade point average, recommendations from faculty of the school they are attending and a committee of the OAB, and their general participation in campus activities.

16 WICHE interns selected

Sixteen University students have been selected for Oregon WICHE internships this summer and began their research projects with agencies and community groups last week.

The students were among 47 interns chosen from more than 500 applicants for positions in this summer's program. They receive an educational stipend to work as independent consultants on a particular research problem for their sponsor. WICHE—the Western Interstate Commission for Higher Education—will publish and distribute their reports in the fall.

WICHE conducts this internship program annually in western states.

Traffic lanes changed

A request for a change in admissions requirements and a discussion of the production of elementary and secondary school teachers in Oregon are among the topics on the agenda of the State Board of Higher Education's Academic Affairs Committee today.

Also being discussed is a University request for authorization to award a certificate in Ethnic Studies.

The meeting is being held in room 327 of Smith Memorial Center on the Portland State University campus, and begins at 9 a.m.

Tuesday, the Board's Finance and Business Affairs Committee and the Building Committee meet. Finance topics include discussion of married student housing charges for 1972-73, an installment tuition plan, and tuition alternatives for 1973-75. The Building Committee's agenda includes the capital construction program for 1973-79. All committee meetings are open to the public.
