

Aid director quits

Larry Large, acting director of the Office of Financial Aid, has resigned to accept a position as Dean of Students at Willamette University, effective August 15.

Large has been in the Office of Financial Aid since March, 1971. He has been on the University's staff since 1964, serving in a number of administrative positions, including the student conduct program, admissions and associate dean of students.

A graduate of Portland State University, where he received his bachelor's degree in psychology in 1964, Large received his Master of Arts degree in history and higher education administration from Oregon in 1970. He has almost completed his doctorate here in higher education administration.

Born in Lewiston, Ida., the 31-year-old Large moved with his family to Oregon when he was four years old. He was educated in elementary schools in Molalla and Mill City and was graduated from high school in Gresham.

He is married and the father of two children.

Professor elected to ICA office

Alfred G. Smith, professor of anthropology and professor of community service and public affairs, has been elected president-elect of the International Communication Association (ICA).

The Association, which numbers some 2,000 or more among its American members, is composed of persons involved in communication from industry, journalism, speech, government, social psychology, etc. The Association also has members in Canada and has connections with similar organizations in India, Latin America and other countries.

It is a research and theory oriented organization with five main units—mass communications, organization communication, intercultural communication, information systems and interpersonal communication. It publishes the Journal of Communication.

As president-elect, Smith will be program chairman for the next general meeting of ICA, to be held in Montreal in April, 1973. He has been on the board of directors of the Association for the past two years as delegate-at-large.

Smith has been a member of the University faculty since 1962.

Prof publishes book on superintendents

Richard O. Carlson, professor of education at Center for the Advanced Study of Educational Administration (CASEA), has published a book entitled "School Superintendents: Careers and Performance." This book is the first CASEA work to be published by a commercial firm, the Charles E. Merrill Publishing Company.

In his book Carlson identifies the two types of school superintendents as "place-bound" and "career-bound." These terms describe the different routes taken by individuals to school superintendencies. The book draws a profile of how today's American school superintendent looks and performs.

'Salt of the Earth' film slated

"Salt of the Earth," a film about a strike by Mexican-American workers in a corporation owned zinc-mining town, will be shown at 7 p.m. tonight in 101 EMU.

The film is sponsored by Eugene Friends of the United Farm Workers and the Lane Political Action Committee. It deals with women's equality, racism and working class struggles, according to a spokesman. Speakers will also discuss the lettuce boycott.

Six concerts set for festival

A series of six concerts will be presented during the community of Eugene-University of Oregon second annual Summer Festival of Baroque Music July 29 through August 6.

Featured in the series will be noted musical director and conductor Helmuth Rilling of Stuttgart, Germany.

Rilling, considered one of the foremost choral conductors in Germany today, will conduct three of the concerts, two presenting Bach's B-Minor Mass and one presenting the music of Heinrich Schütz.

The Festival opens Saturday, July 29, with an 8 p.m. concert of chamber music by Bach, Copland, and Britten.

Edith Kilbuck will give a harpsichord recital Sunday, July 30, featuring the music of Bach, Rameau, and Louis Couperin.

"Bach: Musical Offering" will be the Festival concert of Monday, July 31.

These three concerts will all be at 8 p.m. in the School of Music Recital Hall on the University campus.

The Bach B-Minor Mass concerts will be on Friday, August 4 and Sunday, August 6. The Music of Heinrich Schütz will be Saturday, August 5. These concerts will be at 8 p.m. each night in the Central Lutheran Church at 18th and Potter Streets.

Tickets for the concert series, presented by the Community of Eugene and the University's School of Music, are \$8.50 for adults and \$5.00 for students 12 years through College. Single admission tickets are \$2.50 for adults and \$1.50 for students.

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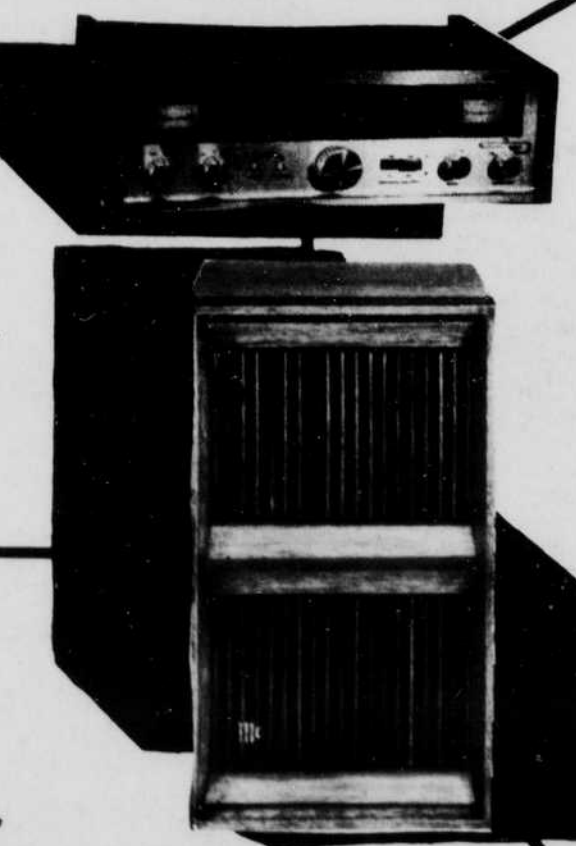


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
