University employee seeks seat

Neil Murray, University program consultant, Wednesday announced that he has filed as a candidate for the Eugene City Council representing Ward 3.

Murray has served on the Mayor's Social Goals Committee, The Equal Treatment Task Force, Westside Neighborhood Quality Project, and the Community School Committee since he arrived in Eugene from Seattle.

Ray Bradshaw currently holds the council seat which Murray has filed for. Bradshaw hasn't filed to retain his seat and isn't expected to.

According to Murray, his "commitment is to the city. More and more, the city is characterized by its seamy side: its noise and congestion, its rising crime rate, its inadequate and ill-maintained housing, its deficient social services. The temptation is to leave it all behind; to seek an easier, less complicated life," he said, "but

in reality, the city can't be left behind. Economic, cultural, commercial, and social necessity created the city. That necessity still exists."

"The only sensible course is to strive to make the city a better, more livable environment," he said. "Ward 3 is the right place to begin. It has three distinct neighborhoods—the Westside, Bethel-Danebo, and West Willakenzie. Together, they are a composite of the city's advantages and problems," Murray said.

"It's not too late," said Murray. "The city need not become a place occupied only by those who can't afford to live elsewhere. But these things (changes in the city) will only happen if and when neighborhoods have strong voices. We know the problems and advantages of our neighborhoods. We live them everyday," he said. Murray was born and raised in Seattle and received his first two college degrees from Washington schools before finishing his Ph.D. work at the University. He is married to an educator and has three children, ages two, five, and six.
