

Robbery suspect lodged in jail

A man identified by the Eugene police as Irving Barry Silverstein has been lodged in the City-County Jail in Eugene on charges of robbery, first degree kidnaping and menacing.

The 29-year old suspect was arrested Friday evening minutes after the U.S. National Bank's campus branch was robbed of approximately \$12,000. The state will file formal complaints against Silverstein today.

The County District Attorney's office intends to file state charges against Silverstein and later confer with federal authorities about whether to prosecute on state or federal charges.

The robbery of the campus branch at 13th and

Alder occurred after 6 p.m., Friday closing time for the bank. The robbery was carried out by a gunman who took a young woman hostage and made her drive him away in her car, police said.

The car was forced to stop at 15th and Alder by police cars which were alerted by a bank alarm and telephone call.

Several officers rushed to the car after it was forced to stop. The suspect, sitting in the right front seat of the auto, attempted to point a revolver at the officers. According to Police Lt. Kenneth Behrend, he was about to shoot through the driver's side window when he saw the suspect drop his weapon, a .22-caliber revolver.

Financial Aid acting director named

Walter Freauff, associate dean of students and associate director of financial aid at the University has been named acting director of the Office of Financial Aid pending the appointment of a permanent director, according to Donald Rhoades, dean of student administrative services.

Freauff, who has been on the faculty of the University since 1959, will replace Larry Large who has resigned, effective August 15, to become dean of students at Willamette University.

Art workshops to get underway

Maude I. Kerns Art Center will hold three workshops this summer, one in batik, one in creative crochet and a jewelry-metalwork workshop.

Stephen Blumrich of California will conduct the batik workshop Aug. 5 and 6. Blumrich will teach a method of making small, sharply detailed, objective batiks which he specializes in. The workshop will cost \$15, including all materials except the half-yard of muslin or sheeting which participants are expected to bring.

Bonnie Meltzer of Beaverton will teach the crochet workshop. Meltzer has a varied and extensive background in both teaching and exhibit. The workshop, which will cost \$35, will be held from July 31 to Aug. 4. Participants must also bring their own materials.

Wednesday marks the deadline for the Jewelry-metalwork workshop to be held Aug. 7-11. Don Duncan, an associate professor in the College of Arts at Ohio State University, will conduct the workshop. The workshop is partially devoted to finding new sources for design concept in jewelry fabrication. The cost of the workshop is \$45 plus a \$5 lab fee, plus the cost of the metals used in the workshop.

In order to participate in the workshops it is necessary to be a member of the center. Membership is \$6 for adults, \$10 for families and \$3 for children through their teens for a year.

Charnelton to be closed for two weeks

Charnelton Street will be closed for about two weeks beginning today as the city of Eugene begins Phase IV of the downtown street widening program.

Charnelton will be closed from Seventh to 11th Avenues with Eighth and Tenth remaining open to each carry one lane of traffic across Charnelton. Advance warning signs will appear in the downtown area to give motorists notice that traffic will be rerouted to Lawrence Street two blocks to the west during the closure.

The four lane Charnelton Street will be ready for use on August 5, which will leave Tenth Ave. as the last section in the downtown loop improvement project.

Under terms of the street improvement contract, Eighth Avenue was to remain closed during the Charnelton improvements, but after the traffic tie up caused during the improving of Oak Street the city paid the Eugene Sand and Gravel Co. \$800 in order to keep Eighth open.

Grants awarded school districts

Three Oregon school districts—Milwaukie, Pendleton, and Estacada—as well as one Washington district—Puyallup—have each been awarded small grants to help them develop or continue community school programs in their respective areas.

Each of the districts received \$3,000 through provisions of a C.S. Mott Foundation Grant to the University. The funding is administered by the Northwest Community Education Development in the University's College Of Education.

Announcement of the awards was made by Ray Hawk, the University's vice president for administration and finance.

Each of the districts, except Estacada, will use its funds to establish a pilot community education program in one or more of its schools. Community education programs are for people of all ages, use existing school facilities, and are geared to the needs and interests of the community they serve.

Emphasis may be on education, recreation, social work, or community development, and extensive use is made of local residents in a volunteer capacity.

Estacada initiated its community school program over a year ago, and its current grant, which will be used for further development of the program, is a renewal of one awarded earlier.

Each district has created a new staff position to provide local leadership for community education activities. Those selected for these new positions will receive special training in community school leadership before their local programs are developed.
