

UN chief says dikes bombed

UNITED NATIONS, N.Y. (AP)—Secretary-General Kurt Waldheim says he has received information through private channels that U.S. bombs have damaged dikes in North Vietnam both by direct hits and by nearby explosions.

He told a news conference Monday he has been assured by the U.S. government that the dikes were not a target, but that he was deeply concerned by word received through sources he

would not identify.

Waldheim noted that he had expressed concern during his Moscow visit about published reports on the alleged bombing of the dikes and had made an appeal for a halt.

He said his informants said some bomb explosions near the dikes had caused cracks which could make the barriers give way, flooding vast areas and causing a heavy loss of life.

"If the dikes are destroyed it

will mean an enormous disaster," he declared.

Asked whether he had any evidence that the bombing was intentional, he replied that he could not say whether the attacks were intentional "but the results are that damage has been done."

"Are you in direct contact with Hanoi?" he was asked.

"I do not wish to comment except to say that my information came through unofficial channels," he said.

Farm worker supporters to show film

The Eugene Frinds of the Farm Workers, a group of local citizens, will present the movies "Strike at Cochella" and "Viva la Causa" on Thursday at 7:30 p.m. in the Dad's Room of the EMU. Speakers from the Portland Boycott Office will also speak of the Lettuce Boycott.

The Lettuce Boycott was called by Cesar Chavez, of the United Farm Workers' Union, in March of this year, when negotiations with lettuce growers broke down. Since that time Chavez fasted for 24 days in Arizona. He called the fast a "call to sacrifice for justice and as a reminder of how much suffering there is among farm workers."

In Eugene, the Friends of the Farm Workers are urging people not to buy iceberg lettuce and circulating pledge cards to this effect.

Sports medicine course begins

A three-day program on sports medicine, entitled "Early Care of the Injured Athlete," began yesterday. It is planned to include more than 250 orthopaedists and professional and college team physicians from 33 states and Canada.

The program is designed to be of practical value to the physician as well as to athletic directors, coaches and trainers. It is being sponsored by the Committee on Sports Medicine of the American Academy of Orthopaedic Surgeons in cooperation with the University's Division of Athletic Medicine.

The course will be held in the University's Science Building. Its Chairman is Dr. Robert L. Larson, senior clinical instructor, department of orthopaedics, from the University Medical School, and orthopaedic consultant from the Athletic Department.

The discussion beginning on Monday was led by a faculty of 29 physicians and sports authorities from 12 states and Canada. They include the team orthopaedists for the New York Jets, New York Rangers, Buffalo Bills, and Houston Astros, as well as the athletic departments of various Universities.
