

Spassky 'feeling good' after Monday's win

REYKJAVIK, Iceland (AP) — World champion Boris Spassky said he was feeling good Monday after winning the 11th title chess game against Bobby Fischer.

Although he still trails Fischer, 6½ to 4½ after 11 games Spassky said he was "quite confident." He went swimming during the day.

Asked about early failures before his brilliant play Sunday, Spassky replied: "Sometimes you just don't play so well. But it's a long match, probably 2½ months, and there's still plenty of time.

"The most important time for me will come about the 16th game. The last eight games are always the most important."

In the 24-game world championship match, each win is a point, a draw is half a point.

Looking tanned and relaxed, Spassky said he had spent the morning working on his strategy for today's 12th game, when Fischer plays first with the white pieces, giving him an advantage.

The title holder was modest about the 14th move Sunday that Danish grandmaster Bent Larsen said was his "first really brilliant move of the match."

It was knight to queen's knight one, a backward sidestep threatening—and eventually taking—Fischer's queen. Spassky said he had not prepared the move in advance. It took him 30 minutes to find it over the board.

"It did not have to win the match," he continued. "Fischer played poorly. His 15th move was a mistake."

This was a pawn move followed by a pawn sacrifice which experts said did not bring enough compensation.

Fischer awoke late Monday afternoon, after returning to his hotel early in the morning from bowling at the NATO air base. He immediately challenged Yugoslav grandmaster Svetozar Gligoric to tennis.

One of Fischer's American aides predicted that Fischer, a combative winner, would "play mean" Tuesday, doing his best to disturb the world champion's concentration.

He squeaks his swivel seat, slurps his orange juice, blows his nose, and moves around when Spassky is sunk in thought.

Morton continued to laud the Nixon Administration's efforts, citing Nixon's commitment "to a new era in which the future for American Indians is determined by Indian acts and Indian decisions."

"We believe that self-determination is the only way Indian people can reach their goals," Morton said. "The fundamental importance of self-determination is that it recognizes Indian dignity, honor and self respect. For too long, these have been ignored and insulted by the White man."

Morton said it was hard for him to accept criticism from Congress about the inaction in the Bureau of Indian Affairs when desperately needed Indian legislation is languishing in committees of the Democrat-controlled Congress. Morton called this "obvious political lethargy."

Morton closed his speech with a quote from Kintpuash of the Modocs who said, "I am but one man. I am the voice of my people. Whatever their hearts are, that I talk." Rogers then said, "You are the leaders of America's Indians and I am listening to your voice and the voice of your people. We are listening to you."

As soon as Morton finished speaking, Benny Atencio, chairman of the All Indian Pueblo Council, Inc. representing the nineteen New Mexico Pueblo tribes, tried to ask Morton some questions that Atencio said had not been answered by other officials of the Dept. of Interior. Morton, said he didn't have time to talk with participants and reporters because he had to return to Washington immediately. He named the representatives of the Dept. of Interior present at the convention and said they would answer the questions.

After some discussion between Atencio and Old Coyote, acting as moderator, the first panel discussion was started. The panel's topic was "Consultation and Self-Determination—A Definition," and was headed by Wendell Chino, a Mescalero Apache.
