

San Diego may be kickoff point

SAN DIEGO, Calif. (AP) — President Nixon, who once wanted to win renomination in San Diego, may still launch his re-election campaign in what he has called his "lucky city," an aide said Wednesday.

Presidential counsellor Robert Finch said Nixon has indicated that he wants to come to San Diego when the Republican National Convention ends Aug. 23

in Miami Beach, Fla.

A decision about whether to use San Diego for a nationally televised public kickoff to the 1972 campaign probably will be made next week, Finch said in an interview.

It depends in part on arrangements for a trip to Japan for conferences between Nixon and the new Japanese prime minister, said Finch, adding that

Nixon probably will spend a week in Southern California as soon as the convention is over.

If San Diego is chosen, Finch said it would serve to make amends for the Republican party's decision in May moving the 1972 convention to Miami Beach. Several party leaders in San Diego have been upset about the site change after a year of planning.

Nixon launched his 1968 campaign in San Diego, about 55 miles south of what now is his Western White House at San Clemente.

A San Diego businessman and Nixon backer, Albert Harutunian, told a reporter: "The President started out here successfully in 1968 and he would be missing a bet if he doesn't do it again."

Finch was in San Diego for a round of speeches and public appearances.

Executive to give convocation address

Forest Amsden, general manager of KGW-TV and other Oregon properties of King Broadcasting Company, will give the commencement address at the University's 1972 summer graduation Convocation Saturday.

The exercises will be held at 10 a.m. in the outdoor Amphitheatre of the School of Music.

The graduation class includes 1,342 candidates for baccalaureate and advanced degrees, of which 571 are candidates for bachelor's degrees, 578 are candidates for master's degrees, and 193 are candidates for doctoral degrees.

University President Robert Clark will confer the degrees.

Amsden has entitled his address "On Freedom."

A native of Montana, Amsden has held newspaper reporting and editing positions with the Lamar, Colo., Daily News, the Lincoln, Neb., Star, the Denver, Colo., Post, and the Coos Bay, Ore., World. He was executive editor and associate publisher of the Oregon newspaper until 1961. He then held positions as Executive Secretary of the Oregon Constitutional Commission, consultant to the Taxation Committee of the State House of Representatives, Executive Secretary of the Portland Committee on Race and Education.

He became news analyst of KGW-TV in 1964, succeeding now-Governor Tom McCall. He held a number of news executive positions with the King Broadcasting Company prior to becoming General Manager in Portland in 1970.

Amsden is a graduate of the University of Colorado, and a Congressional Fellow of the American Political Science Association. He has worked on the Washington staffs of the late Congressman Clem Miller of Calif., and the late Senator Estes Kefauver of Tenn.

Following the commencement exercises, an Alumni Association reception will be held in the Music School Band Room for members of the graduating class, their parents, and friends and the faculty.

Councilman Teague will seek re-election

A second term on the Eugene City Council will be sought by Charles Teague in November, he announced Tuesday.

Teague represents Ward IV which covers the southwest section of the city and is the first announced candidate from that ward.

Teague, a lumber mill owner, is the second councilman to announce his bid for re-election. Fred Mohr announced earlier that he will seek his Ward I council seat for a second term.

Teague was first appointed to the council in August, 1968, to fill the remainder of the term of R. E. McNutt, who resigned.
