Fuller to speak tonight at Mac Court

Buckminster Fuller, distinguished author, architect, philosopher, and social thinker, will speak at the University at 8 p.m. tonight in McArthur Court.

Fuller is considered by some to be a special genius and by others an eccentric dreamer. His lectures characteristically address themselves to multi-faceted problems and offer simple, unified solutions.

Known by many as the designer of the geodesic dome, Fuller's voluminous writings encourage the use of imagination and creativity in all forms of human activity. His own writing and speaking often takes a prose-like form in which he invents terms and uses an inimitable syntax.

Fuller has authored six books and dozens of articles in many leading periodicals.

Within the speech, titled "This Spaceship Earth," Fuller will offer his suggestions as to how the Earth can be made a good place to live. The public is invited and there will be no admission. The ASUO Cultural Forum is the sponsor of the speech.

LCC stops library thefts

A \$17,000 detection system which will virtually halt theft from the Lane Community College library has been installed at the college in time for winter term.

Formerly called "tattle tale" by its manufacturer, the book detection system electronically scans each book removed from the library and automatically locks an exit gate if the book hasn't been properly checked out. Personal books and books already processed will not cause the gate to lock, a feature college officials demanded before purchasing the system.

Authorities were concerned that a system without such a feature would interfere with the school's philosophy of openness and free access.

Book loss from the LCC library has exceeded 4,000 copies during the past four years, amounting to a list value of about \$40,000. Head librarian Del Matheson said replacement costs are even higher than list prices because of labor and research costs.

A special gate was installed alongside the main exit to allow wheelchair students access to and from the library.

Dutch college applications available

The Spring Semester in Holland of the American College of Amsterdam will begin Feb. 5, and applications will be accepted until Jan. 19. The program is limited to 50 students; all instruction is in English, by American faculty and University of Amsterdam professors.

Alien address reports due

William Pattillo, District Director of the Immigration and Naturalization Service advised today that the annual alien address report program is again under way.

According to Pattillo, 25, 982 aliens reported their addresses last year in Oregon. The number this year is expected to be slightly larger.

The Immigration official pointed out that the address reports are required by law and willful failure to comply with these requirements may lead to serious consequences.

Forms with which to make the reports are available at all Post Offices and Immigration and Naturalization Service Offices. It is an easy matter to fill out one of the cards and return it to the same office. For those unable to personally return the cards, they may be mailed to the Immigration and Naturalization Service.

Pattillo added that trained personnel will be on hand in all offices of the Immigration and Naturalization Service to answer any questions the reporting aliens may have regarding Immigration and Naturalization matters. Sufficient trained personnel are not available to furnish this assistance in all Post Offices.
